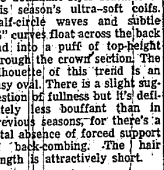
Westbrook PTA is sponsoring a Fair to be held Saturday, April 30 from 3 to 8 p.m. at the school.

Mayfair Plans Fathers' Day

The children of the three sessions of the Mayfair Cooperative Nursery will meet during scheduled periods with their fathers for Mayfair's annual Father's Day on Saturday, April 16.

Each child must be accompanied by his father or other male adult — grandfather, uncle, etc. No female adults allowed. Will be the order of the day except, of course, teachers "Miss Jane" Egan and "Miss Mary" Pascoe.

This day provides an opportunity for Mayfair fathers to see the school — its equipment and facilities, to get acquainted with each other, and to see the children in action.

A member of the Michigan Council of Co-operative Nurseries, the Mayfair Nursery has been in operation four years. It grew out of a meeting of eight suburban mothers concerned over the lack of alternatives for their children. After three years of using borrowed facilities, the Mayfair group rented its own school, a 100-year old country school, which was no longer in use. The do-it-yourself never played an important part in the new building as fathers volunteered their time to build play equipment and the building's owner offered to redecorate the school.
