**Timely Tips on GARDENING**

**SPRING ARRIVES** - Farmington is bursting with life. Children and gardeners are bustling about. The buds are swelling on branches and stems and tiny green leaves are pushing forth from their double flowered white dogwood has been developed. It has from eight to twelve overlapping bracts instead of the usual four pink bracts.  
Pink dogwoods have been in cultivation since 1731, but only recently a red-flowered form has been developed. It is called Cherokee Chief and has vivid flowers up to four inches in diameter. New Spring foliage is bright crimson, turning green in summer, and developing a rich summer color again in Fall.  
Most dogwoods are shade-loving and can be planted beneath other trees. Full coloration is brighter with less dense shade, however.  
There is a member of the dogwood family whose family relationship is generally overlooked. This is the black gum tree. It is not a flowering ornamental, but is a good shade tree.  
**REMEMBERS** - The frost is out of the ground and gardeners can be spared and hardy seeds can be planted. Plant radish, lettuce, spinach, carrots, peas, beans, and onion sets.  
Plant annual flowers such as bachelor buttons, forget-me-nots, poppies, larkspur, and sweet peas.  
Remove mulch from beds and edge the beds.  
If beds are cultivated, be careful not to disturb plants that are late in coming up.  
Unhill and prune roses.  
Prune buddleia, Rose of Sharon, and hydrangea.  
Feed lawns, trees, and shrubs.  
Plant deciduous trees and shrubs.  
Plant bulbs.  
Don't forget that spring planting is a must for thin-barked trees.
