Delay Action On Proposed Retiring Policy

A recommendation by the personnel sub-committee of the School Citizens Advisory Committee to establish a retirement policy in the Farmington public school system has been tabled for further study.

At the present time he local system has no policy at all. The citizens committee's proposal is that teachers and all other school personnel in the local system be required to retire at age 65. In a report made at the regular Board of Education meeting Monday night, Floyd Jay, personnel sub-committee spokesman, indicated that a survey had been made and that Farmington was about the only school system not having a retirement policy. The Michigan Education Association also recommends a retirement policy similar to the one proposed. Jay commented.

Under the proposed plan retirement at age 65 would be made mandatory as of June 1, 1962.

A request by Farmington Education Association President Berry McGuire that a decision on the proposed plan be delayed until a further study can be made by an FEA committee and other interested parties was agreed to by the School Board and Jay.

Representatives of the FEA and other school personnel groups were invited to attend a meeting of the personnel sub-committee on March 4 to discuss the proposed policy in detail.

Board members indicated that they would like more time to study the matter as well.

It was agreed to delay action until the second School Board meeting in the coming month on Monday, May 23.
