Pastor Bayne Explores Mexican Jungle Missions

Pastor Raymond Bayne of the Southern Baptist Church, 21122 Indian (near Inter-ster and Eight Mile) recently completed a trip to the jungles of Mexico in the interest of missions. Leaving here Monday morning, March 21st, he flew to Chicago and then flew non-stop to Mexico City, and the Wycliffe Bible Translators Headquarters there. The next day was spent in a tour of the Shrine of the Virgin of Guadalupe and of the ancient Aztec pyramids giving a glimpse of both ancient and modern paganism.

All other ministers and a laymen were made in Am. Arbores. Sixing Rev. Alfred Holman of the Knox Presbyterian Church in Detroit and Rev. William Bennett of the Methodist Church in Ann Arbor. The group was led by Dr. John Crawford of the Wycliffe Bible Translators whose home is in Am. Arbores.

The next day the group flew six hundred miles southeast to almost the tip of Mexico to the city of Toluca. Driving from there, the group went up in the mountains to Las Casas, a Mexican city of 28,000 population with 100,000 Indians coming there regularly to buy and sell supplies. Here they visited the open market, the Santa Dominga church, perhaps the oldest church in the Americas built many centuries ago by 20,000 slaves. The walls of this church on both sides are covered with gold. Here they also met Mr. and Mrs. Ken Jacobs, Wycliffe missionaries working among the Indians.

FROM LAS CASAS they flew to the Jungle Training Camp of the Wycliffe Bible Translators which is four days' walk from the nearest outpost of civilization, and from there down to the advance base. Going by dugout canoe up the river and shooting the rapids they arrived in the jungle where new missionaries are receiving survival training, hacking out their own living areas in the dense jungle and building their own homes, furniture, stoves, etc. Bating whatever is available, Pastor Bayne was

Timely Tips on GARDENING

MAGNOLIAS . . . At this time of year, when Farmington gardens are burgeoning with color, one plant stands out above all the rest. This most dramatic specimen is the saucer magnolia, Magnolia soulangeana, a small tree bearing huge pinkish-white blossoms. When the buds first open they resemble immense tulips, but after they have spread wide their petals they are saucer shaped.

There are numerous varieties of saucer magnolia available. Flowers range in size from five inches in diameter to ten inches. The outside color of the petals ranges from palest pink through purple-pink to deep wine-red, thus the buds are of ten deeply colored. The interior of the petals are generally pure white so the opened blossom presents a pale white appearance.

Soulangiana Alexandrina is a handsome variety that blooms before the common saucer magnolia, and the purple lily magnolia, Magnolia lilyifolia, is a bit later and continues until June.

Although the saucer magnolia is in the North, the beautiful Magnolia grandiflora in the South are the best known magnolias, they are by no means the only members of this family. There are over two dozen cultivated varieties that will grow in this climate. There are at least a half dozen species that are native to the United States. Most of these are found in the Southeastern part of the country. The great-leaved magnolia, M. macrophylla, has the largest leaves of any tree native to temperate North America.

The tulip tree, a magnolia, is tall forest tree, is the only member of the family native to Michigan, but some such as the sweet bay, M. virginiana, are grown as cultivated specimens.

In the South the sweet bay is a tall tree, but when grown here it attains the proportions of a large shrub. Its fragrant white flowers are produced in late Spring and early summer. Unlike most magnolias, the sweet bay thrives in heavy soil.

Most of the cultivated magnolias are of Asiatic origin. The magnolia is one of these that is increasing in popularity. Its flowers come in numerous slender, long, pink or white petals and it has long narrow leaves that distinguish it from the coarse leaved saucer magnolia. It flowers in April several weeks before the saucer magnolia blossoms.

The Oryopsis magnolia flowers in June, as does the Watson magnolia. The Watson magnolia and some of the other original varieties are not recommended for the home garden because they grow

too large and have coarse textured foliage and are apt to be rather ungainly.

Magnolias should be planted in Spring. They are rather difficult to transplant, and severe injury the roots should be balled and burlapped when they are being moved. The General Conference of the Methodist Church opened April 27th in Denver, Colorado, as 880 delegates from 31 nations knelt to receive Holy Communion and pray for spiritual guidance.

The conference is the supreme policy-making body of the church and meets every four years. It is to the church what congress is to the nation. The Michigan Area has 26 delegates attending the conference, 12 from the Detroit Conference, which makes up the eastern half of the State and the upper peninsula, and 8 delegates from the Michigan conference which is the western half of the State. These delegates are equally divided between ministers and laymen.

They were elected by the annual conferences of 1959 to serve in the General Conference of 1960, to review progress, plan projects, and to adopt a program for the next four years. Also, any revisions in the DISCIPLINE, official rule book of the Methodist church, must be made by this group.
