At Purdue, Reunion

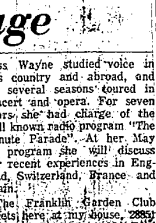
Intermediate Girl Scout Troop 180 enjoyed its first overnight outing at Camp Narrin on April 29.
