'Hasty Heart' To Open Fri. Night

It was at an ambulance depot in the Syrian desert where he was stationed with the American Field Service during World War II that John Patrick met the lonely enlisted Scottish sergeant who was later to serve the playwright as a model for Sergeant Landon MacLachlan, the central character in Patrick's comedy-drama called "The Hasty Heart," which opens at the Farmington Players' Barn Theatre on May 6th and will be presented again the 7th, 13th and 14th.

Patrick, who was then a sergeant himself in an ambulance unit attached to British forces, noticed that the Scottish soldier was awkward and uncomfortable with other men. He seemed very lonely, but that he was antagonistic to all overtures of friendship. He would eat hurriedly, pay no heed to those around him and depart from the mess hall before anyone could draw him into conversation.

After a run of 204 performances in New York, this comedy drama enjoyed a successful country-wide tour and was later a hit when presented in London. ENSA, the British equivalent of USO, presented the play throughout the CBI.

ministered first aid and called police. The manhunt got underway as some 85 State Troopers, Farmington Township and West Bloomfield Township police, as well as Oakland County Sheriff's deputies joined in the search.

Robber found unusual footprints in the soft ground around Small's abandoned car. Stachan's trail was tracked through the night by teams of police. State Police Detective Hubert Hanley spotted similar prints in the sand early Sunday morning outside the Farmington Township house which was under construction, located on Herndon Wood Drive off Inker Road between 11 and 12 Mile Road.

HANLEY and TWO troopers entered the house and spotted Stachan hiding in the attic. The young gunman surrendered meekly and was taken to the Bedford State Police Post.

After his capture Stachan freely admitted 15 taxicab robberies as well as passing several bad checks both in the Detroit area and in Florida. He sided the abduction and shooting of Small.

The cocky young bandit said he was planning to let Small go unharmed but hid his head when his captive ran off with the car keys.

Stachan said he planned to use the car Monday in a planned hold-up of a loan office in Detroit.

Following his arraignment in Farmington Township Justice Court on a Southfield armed robbery warrant that was returned April 4, Stachan was returned to his cell in the Oakland County Jail.

Shiawassee Has Arbor Program

Last Friday, April 29, marked Shiawassee School's inauguration of an Arbor Day program. The program was highlighted by the actual planting of seven trees by each classroom including the kindergarten children.

The trees were purchased by the Parent Teachers Association of Shiawassee School and selected by Mr. Jackson, principal, Mrs. Darnton, and Mr. Delewsky.

Arbor Day is that one special day of the year, usually the

last Friday in April, that is set aside by our governor for the planting of trees. J. Sterling Morton, one of our first Secretaries of Agriculture, and a man well known in this field, was the person we are indebted to for this memorable day.

The program itself was preceded by an intensive study of trees by all pupils. Some of the questions the children wanted to find answers to are as follows: (1) How deep do we plant our trees? (2) How do we care for broken branches? (3) How do we protect trees from their enemies? (4) How do we prune trees? (5) When do we plant trees in Michigan? (6) How much, and what kind of fertilizer do we need?

On the day of the ceremony, the pupils had an assembly program using "Trees" as its central theme. The assembly was presented by pupils of the third, fourth and sixth grades.

Parents in attendance expressed their satisfaction in this event. "The children along with the teachers felt this experience to be most enriching in the area of conservation of natural resources, which is part of the science program taught in our schools."

Amend Ord'nance In Wood Creek

Members of the Wood Creek Farms Council voted Tuesday to amend the present swimming pool construction ordinance in the following manner: The term "wall" as applied to swimming pools shall be the exterior vertical surface of the structure as it rises above the ground level or grade. Otherwise it will be the interior vertical surface of the pool at the top.

In addition, the pool must not extend beyond the front line of a house and must be within 10 feet of the back lot line. A 15 foot margin must be maintained from the side lot lines.

A pool could be situated next to a house provided the above restrictions are abided by.

the city's zoning ordinance which permits batch plants and other similar commercial operations in residential zones which are set up on a temporary basis.

COUNCILMEN were in agreement that some dust, etc. might blow onto property nearest the batch plant but felt that this would not be in excessive amounts. When strong winds are blowing from the south or southwest the paving construction company has agreed to discontinue operations until the winds subside, it was indicated. The contractors will use Freedom and Gill roads to get to Alta some 1/4 subdivision for pouring their, it was emphasized. They have agreed to use chemicals to keep dust down.

Barring unexpected exceptionally wet weather, all paving projects in the city are slated for completion by June 15, Engineer Pappas said. The batch plant will be torn down as soon as the paving work is done, he added.

Resign Issue Pops Up Again

Richard Norvall, Wood Creek Village Road Administrator, requested again at Tuesday's meeting of the Wood Creek Council that his resignation be accepted.

Norvall had submitted a letter of resignation to the Council at the April meeting but the letter was left unread as the meeting was adjourned. Instead, Council members gave Norvall a vote of confidence and suggested he reconsider his plans to resign.

After lengthy discussion of the matter at Tuesday's meeting, a motion was passed to have Councilmen Ambrose and Kevlar work with Norvall on road problems until a suitable replacement can be found, or until such time that Norvall reconsiders his wish to resign.
