Marian Day This Sunday at U of D

On Sunday afternoon, May 15, at 2:30 p.m., complete with banners, floats and uniforms, the Detroit area people will gather at the University of Detroit Stadium to pay homage to the most honored of all mothers, the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Marian Day Celebration here will be sponsored by the Detroit Archdiocesan Federation of Socially Unions. Archbishop John F. Dearden will preside at the afternoon's ceremonies. He will be attended by the Knights of St. John, the Knights of St. Peter, the Knights of St. Paul, and the Knights of Columbus. This colorful and dignified honoring of the Mother of Christ will include a procession beginning at 2:30 p.m. complete with banners, floats and uniforms. The rosary will be recited by the entire congregation while on the field, men and boys in blue and white uniforms, and girls in white uniforms will show honor to Mary as Her Sons of All Ages. Speaker of the day will be Reverend Lucian A. Hebert, Pastor of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Parish, Master of Ceremonies will be the Reverend Robert J. Burroughs, Archdiocesan Social Director. OF SPECIAL significance during the ceremony will be the crowning of an icon of Our Lady of Vladimir by Doris Joseph, Federation President. Our Lady of Vladimir has been selected as patroness of Marian Day because this particular icon is considered to be the most precious religious symbol of the Russian people. The reasons for making this icon better known and loved among Catholic people of the West are threefold: (1) to unite Russia with other countries of the world in prayers for peace; (2) to encourage people to recognize; (3) to encourage prayers for the conversion of Russia; (4) to support Pope John XXIII in preparing for the Ecumenical Council by an example of friendliness to the East.

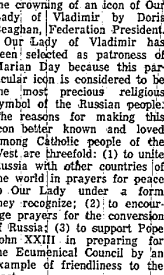

Witness Group Has Assembly

The congregation was first formed in November 1944. At that time it met at 8 Mile and Grand River in the area known as Clarenceville. Mr. Delos Ludwig was the presiding minister. The territory that this congregation served originally was from Highland Road on the north to Schoolcraft on the south, from Farmington on the east to U.S. 23 on the west. In January 1949, they moved into their new Kingdom Hall on 22802 Orchard Lake Road. In 1953, because of the phenomenal growth, the congregation was divided into three territories: the South Farmington, North Farmington and Millard, Dolos Ludwig, Flem Canfield and Victor Stalmay were the presiding ministers respectively. The growth continued and May 1958, the South Farmington unit was divided and a new unit, the North Livonia, was formed.
