

# Falcon Hitting Spree Downs Walled Lake

Pouring rain in the first four innings made for a wet field, but the birds played well in spite of caggy conditions. The sun finally appeared in the last inning to ironically shut down the Farmington team.

Through scoring against their own opponents, the Falcon pitchers Darryl Allen was the distance for Farmington, picking up his first win of the year. Tom Smith collected three hits in the game and both Jackie and Allen contributed home runs to the Falcon tally.

Farmington drew its third defeat of the year Tuesday May 10, in a 2-0 contest with Southfield. The Jays swooped down in the last inning with an eight run rally that stole an almost certain shutout from the Falcons.

Rex recently set a new frosh record at Southern Cal. He ran the 800 hurdles in 41.20, the not so fast, 500 yard race, he also tied the school freshman record with a time of 14.2 in the 120 yard high hurdles.

These feats take on added significance considering that two former world champion hurdlers, Fred and Jerry Elder of Wayburn, Tex., are in the area.

West coast track writer, Clark Cawley, a "real star". Rex also points out the fact that Rex evidently was well coached as a schoolboy at Farmington High School.

"People up here on the coast can't get over his competitive attitude," Clark said. "He does not want to be beaten at his own game."
