DR. BRODMAN, at this point, drew five basic points on the rezoning procedures in the township. The first point stipulated that everyone should be treated alike and given fair consideration.

(2) That no condemnation should be started when the owner is making the best use of facilities and topography. (3) That no condemnation be exercised when owner is making sincere effort to cooperate with restrictions. (4) No condemnation unless legal grounds exist other than on hearsay evidence and (5) That the property rights of taxpayers be zealously guarded.

Dr. Brodman continued his discussion of condemnation procedures and related health problems as well as duties of his office at great length. At the conclusion of his talk he asked for a motion from the board to adopt the five basic policies. He also asked for opinions from Board Members on his various ideas.

Trustee Wendell Johnson stated that the Doctor had covered such a wide area that he would have to have a copy of the presentation for study before making any comments. A motion that the Doctor submit suggestions and recommendations to the Board for study was carried.

It further stated that he has no culvert in the driveway and that his partially completed basement is constantly filled with water.

The subject of water in ditches came up for general discussion and the Township Health Officer expressed the opinion that at the present time this condition did not constitute a health hazard.

Supervisor Hall pointed out that the Township had no authority on the ditches as they were under the jurisdiction of the Oakland County Road Commission.

Discuss Twp. Construction

A plat of 224 lots in the area of the southeast corner of Middlebelt and 11 Mile Road was submitted to the Township Board for consideration.

The plat, to be known as Lincolnshire Subdivision, has been referred to the planning board for their consideration.

In addition, a letter from the Superintendent of Farmington Schools requesting that either the Township or County undertake a road building program in the Kimberly subdivision was read and discussed at Tuesday's meeting.

Mr. Hall advised that he would contact Superintendent Harrison on the request.

New Power Mower

A brand new power lawnmower is on its way for the Longacre elementary school. A sum of \$119 was authorized for the purchase of the mower and it is expected to arrive Monday night.

Pre-Kergarten Programs Set

Pre-school programs will be conducted in each of the twelve elementary schools in the Farmington public school system during the next two weeks, May 18-27.

These programs are conducted annually for the purpose of acquainting pre-school children, those eligible to start kindergarten in September, with a typical school building and kindergarten room. As a part of these programs, children will spend a 45 minute period designed to provide them with the experience of a typical kindergarten day.

Groups of children kept to a minimum and regular kindergarten classes are dismissed so that the kindergarten teacher may devote her complete attention to the pre-school youngsters.

While the pre-school youngsters are in class, their parents will be asked to contact the general characteristics of the kindergarten program, the preparation of the pre-schooler for kindergarten, school services and to answer any questions parents might have.

Parents who have not yet received notices to register their children are asked to contact the nearest elementary school or Board of Education office. Children must be five years of age on or before December 1, 1967, to be eligible to start kindergarten in September.

COOPERATION of the Farmington Township and West Bloomfield Township police forces has been promised for this experimental safety project, Hossier stated. They will be checking for unsafe driving practices by adults and unsafe acts by children while walking.

The experimental program will get underway shortly.

An investigation has now been completed for seven of the 12 elementary schools in the district, the Board was informed. It is hoped that investigations in the vicinity of the other five schools can be completed before the end of the current school year, Hossier said.

Slopes are already being taken to get some of the unsafe walking conditions which presently exist corrected, it was indicated. "It was also pointed out, however, that some of the safety measures called for will not be possible to accomplish and many more will take a considerable amount of time and effort to get completed."

It was finally resolved to pass two separate resolutions. One was designed to indicate to the Township Planning Board that the School Board could see nothing wrong with the plat providing the easements called for were included. The other resolution was in the form of instructions to have a letter sent to the Township Board and Planning Board clearly indicating that the School Board was in favor of adoption of the newly proposed residential zoning ordinance at the earliest possible date.

THE OTHER two plats were for proposed subdivisions in the central portion of Section 26 north of Shawwassee and east of Truck Road. The biggest, Westgate Subdivision, covers 445 lots and the other to the north, Farmington Meadows, for approximately 125 lots.

Multiplying this by approximately two children per home and you come up with over 1100 children the school district would have to provide classrooms for. Based on this, the Board of Education's recommendation to the Township-Planning Board was that these plats not be approved until some provision for a ten acre school site within this proposed development area are made.

In both subdivisions, the lot sizes called for are based on present zoning minimum requirements and not on the larger sized specified under the new zoning.
