As you enter, there is an ex-
hibit case containing historic
documents that are pertinent to
the growth of Farmington. On
your right there is an attrac-
tive adult lounge. The lounge
also houses the magazines and
newspapers. The library sub-
scribes to 25 magazines and
newspapers. In addition, there
are an additional 25 periodicals
that have been given as gifts.

These gifts include official
publications of various church-
es, the "Christian Science Moni-
tor," "The Wall Street Jour-
nal," "Foreign Affairs Quar-
terly," "Forum," "Congressional
Record," "Horticulture," "The
Flower Grower," "Theatre Arts
Magazine," and "Scientific

The subscription magazines are
general and varied in nature.
Those who collect and stud-
antiques will be interested to
know that the library now has
