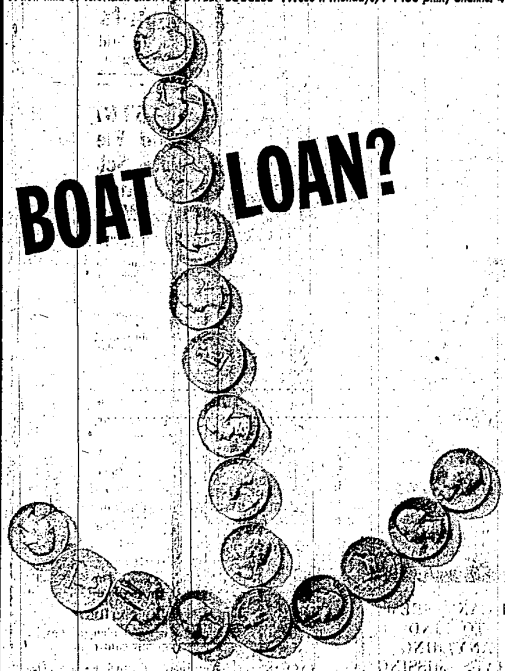
The final Olympic trials to be held in Palo Alto, California, on July 12 will be the final trial for Hayes Jones as a representative of Eastern Michigan University.



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Records Fall in 14th Annual Inter-Lakes Conference Meet

A clear evening, a fast track and a host of skilled high school athletes were responsible for the record breaking day at the 14th Annual Inter-Lakes Conference Track Meet, held at Southfield's indoor track last Wednesday, May 12.

It was evident even before the final scores were tallied that Waterford would come out on top. They did with 54 points. Walked Lake and Berkley received second and third places with 40 and 28 points, respectively. Farmington and Pontiac Northern were tied for fourth at 22 points apiece. Southfield's point total of 19 took last place.

The Varsity baseball team has gotten the worst of the weather. Their baseball season started off on a wet house when the opening game with

Royal Oak Kimball April 18 was cancelled, and their second game, against Clarenceville April 18, was postponed because of the weather. The Northern game was rained out. Misfortune falls in twos for this squad, for on May 13, the game with Berkley was called off because of the weather. The Northern game was played on May 16, and the Berkley game will be played on May 27. Rain must be expected frequently in Farmington, for all the cancelled or postponed games were home games.

The reserve baseball team played fewer games, but still could not go through the season without a washout. The May 12 Berkley game was postponed, and to date as best out for a re-play.

Falcon trackmen were more fortunate (or unfortunate, depending how you look at it) for they were able to continue all of their meets, in spite of the bad weather conditions. The 100-yard race, which was participated in the Central Michigan Relays, in Mt. Pleasant, on April 30, ran and jumped in low 50 degree weather.
