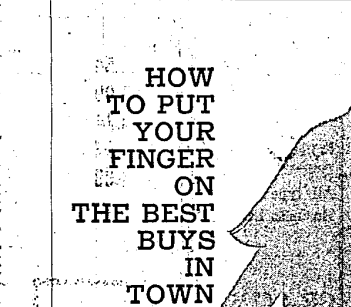

Test Radar Unit On Twp. Roads

TOWNSHIP POLICE CHIEF Irv Yakes checks speeds of motorists traveling south on Orchard Lake Road near 10 Mile Road with the Radar Timer used on a trial basis during the past week. The timer is mounted on one of the two new police cars purchased recently.

Township Police officers have been experimenting with the Radar Timer, a speed control device, on several roads throughout the township during the past week.

According to results of previous field tests the unit has been proven to operate within a 2 percent margin of error, always in favor of the motorist, compact 9 1/2 x 10 1/2 inch aluminum case contains the amplifier with multiple range switch. The amplifier itself weighs only 15 lbs. with the antenna housing weighing 3 lbs. and the speedometer 2 1/2 lbs.

The Radar Timer measures speed up to 100 miles per hour and operates on a frequency of 10.55 megacycles. Cars can be measured from 100 to 600 feet away and buses can be clocked up to a range of 1,500'. Violators can be accurately detected in either approaching or departing traffic lanes.

Have Con-Con Petitions Out

The Farmington Chapter of Citizens for Michigan is taking an active part in the current drive to obtain enough signatures to place an amendment on the ballot in November calling for a constitutional convention. It is not necessary to be a member of Citizens for Michigan to circulate these petitions, Tyler emphasized.

There are more than 60 members of the Farmington Chapter who now have petitions out and will be glad to contact those wishing to sign. Tyler concluded.

The deadline for signing is June 30.

Other organizations taking an active part in circulating petitions are the League of Women Voters, the Michigan Education Association, Michigan Junior Chamber of Commerce, Parent and Teachers Association, Detroit Educational Association, Detroit Bar Association, Detroit Building Trades Council and Michigan Council of Churches.

Area Delegates To Attend 98th Convention

Edith Powers, Ada Bronson, both of Farmington, have been named delegates to the 98th annual convention of the National Education Association to be held in the Shrine Auditorium, Los Angeles, June 28 - July 1.

Themed "A United Profession Enhances Quality in Education," the conference of the largest professional organization in the world is expected to attract some 20,000 educators from all over the country.

Keynote speakers will be NBC news commentator, Pauline Frederick and Senators Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota and John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky.

Highlighting the six-day program will be Classroom Teacher Night which will feature a banquet for some 3,000 classroom teachers in the Paladium and a concert, "Starlight Symphony," by the Los Angeles Symphony Orchestra in the Hollywood Bowl.

Other major events will include the Presidents' Reception, the Public Affairs and Notables Dinners and Friendship Night.

SOME 200 DELEGATES from Michigan will be active participants in the general and business sessions, department meetings and group discussions. They will also attend a state delegation luncheon, a state breakfast in the Statler Hilton Hotel, June 29, at 7:30 a.m.

Vital areas for discussion will include such topics as: new frontiers of elementary, secondary and higher education; exceptional children; biological sciences; industry in education; the teacher's enjoyment; and instructional programs in the public schools.

Representing the staff of the Michigan Education Association will be Dr. E. Dale Kennedy, executive secretary; Dr. Fred J. Vescedoli, associate professor of education, Michigan State University; president; Cecil C. Blum, department chairman and director of regional conferences; and Arthur R. Rice, Jr., editor of the ME Journal.

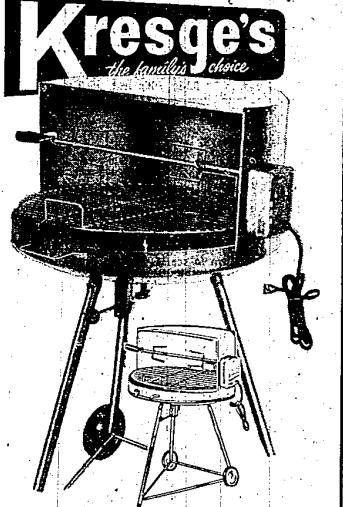
