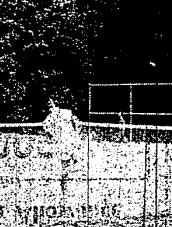

### Frosh To Meet Same Old Existing Problems

The problems of the university freshmen haven't changed much in a half-century. Famous novelist Lloyd C. Douglas ("The Robe," "Magnificent Obsession" etc.), then President of the First Congregational Church in Ann Arbor, penned a letter of advice for University of Michigan freshmen in 1916 that would do nicely for the class to enter this fall.

The novelist's advice to freshmen is included in a collection of personal materials in the Michigan Historical Collections at the U-M. The collection contains the original manuscript of "The Robe."

DOUGLAS' advice to freshmen reads in part:

- 1) Don't be stampeded. These are trying days for you with scurrying about to locate suitable quarters and a good boarding place.

- 2) Be a freshman. Being snubbed by superiors and roughed up a bit by one's equals is excellent discipline. Douglas says, "Keep these other people meet the same problems, and they lived through it."

- 3) STRIVE FOR culture. The University should be able to do considerably more for you than to allow your point to be reduced to order. Keep your head. Do one thing at a time.

- 4) Be a freshman. Being snubbed by superiors and roughed up a bit by one's equals is excellent discipline. Douglas says, "Keep these other people meet the same problems, and they lived through it."

- 5) STRIVE FOR culture. The University should be able to do considerably more for you than to allow your point to be reduced to order. Keep your head. Do one thing at a time.

### Timely Tips on GARDENING

Roses are the main attraction in many Farmington gardens. In June they commence blooming with a riotous explosion of color. This display continues throughout the summer on an equally gay, though somewhat diminished, scale. However, for those to put on their tank per performance and to continue to drive for many years a few simple cultural needs must be met.

Roses need a spot with good air circulation. Don't put them in a fenced-in nook, and don't crowd them. Allow ample space between plants. A plant in a flower bed should be planted at least 18 to 24 inches apart; and hybrid teas need to be two to three feet apart. Climbers should be spaced six feet apart.

ROSE PLANTS need sunlight for at least half a day. Plants thrive in full sun, although colors tend to bleach out more than in partially shaded areas.

Adequate drainage is also a must. If soil is soggy, the bed should be moved to another location, or a drainage system installed below the bed.

Roses should have rich soil. If the soil is light, or of poor fertility it should be enriched with humus or well-rotted manure. Commercial fertilizers may also be used. Clay soil that has been enriched and lightened a bit with humus is an ideal medium for growing roses.

If the soil is enriched before planting, little additional fertilizer is needed the first year. In subsequent years, roses should be given a feeding when growth starts in early Spring, and at monthly intervals until late July. Late summer feedings are advisable because new growth will be forced out that will not have time to harden and mature before freezing weather arrives. There are chemical fertilizers available that have been compounded especially for roses, or an organic fertilizer such as concentrated liquid fish fertilizer may be used.

ROSES need to be protected from the ravages of insects, mites, and fungus diseases. The easiest and best procedure for this is to use an all purpose spray or dust that will attack all three pests at once. This should be applied every seven to ten days during the growing season and repeated to use and...
