Keep Picnic Food Either Hot or Cold

Lukewarm temperature in food is the ideal climate for food-poisoning microorganisms. They thrive in non-acid items, such as meat, most vegetables, potato salad and cream pastries.

Dr. Ralph Costlow, of Michigan State University, says that foods kept at 140 degrees Fahrenheit are perfectly safe, and that foods refrigerated at 45 degrees are protected. But lukewarm temperatures in non-acid foods should be avoided.

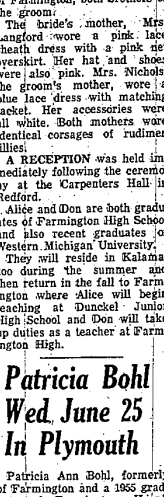

Twins Born June 27

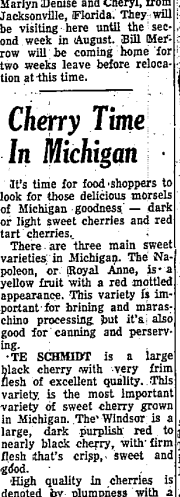

It's time for food shoppers to look for these delicious Michigan goodies — dark or light sweet cherries and tart cherries.

There are three main sweet varieties in Michigan: The Napoleon, or Royal Anne, is a large, dark purplish red to nearly black cherry, with firm flesh that's crisp, sweet and good.

High quality in cherries is denoted by plumpness with a bright appearance, firmness and good color. When they become dull and lustreless, you may be sure they've been around too long for best flavor and texture.

THE SCHMIDT is a large black cherry with very firm flesh of excellent quality. This variety is the most important variety of sweet cherry grown in Michigan. The Windsor is a large, dark purplish red to nearly black cherry, with firm flesh that's crisp, sweet and good.

High quality in cherries is denoted by plumpness with a bright appearance, firmness and good color. When they become dull and lustreless, you may be sure they've been around too long for best flavor and texture.

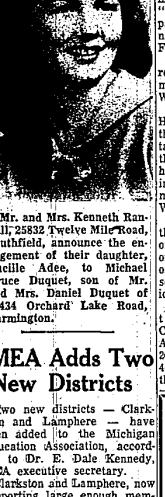
