Set Theme for C.S. Services

Shepherd King Church To Present Play On July 21

The Bishop's Company of Santa Barbara, California, will present Christopher Fry's "The Boy With A Cart" on July 21, 1960, 8:15 p.m. at the Church of the Shepherd King, Middlebelt at Maple, W. Bloomfield Road. The "unique repertory" company is now in its sixth year of touring from coast to coast.
Written by the celebrated author of "The Fireburn" and "The Lady's Not For Burning," the play serious in the extreme and yet plays with the special brand of Fry humor that has made him a Broadway favorite. No stage setting will be used for the unique presentation of "The Boy With A Cart," but both the actors and the audience will find a pleasant meadow in the south of England as the play is presented in the church's chancel.

FOUNDED in 1952 by Phyllis Bonow Barstey, The Bishop's Company has toured over 400,000 miles playing in 43 states and Canada. It has appeared as part of the official visiting program of the Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches at Evanston; at Yale Divinity School, Princeton Theological Seminary, Rutgers University, Wittenberg College and many other colleges and universities. Churches which have acclaimed this unusual touring company currently featuring two traveling units, includes the President's church in Washington, National Presbyterian Church, Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church, Minneapolis; St. Paul's Church, New Haven; Taylor Road Synagogue, Cleveland.

The Bishop's Company is independent of the U. S. C. I. It is an independent organization named in honor of Bishop Gerald H. Kennedy of the Methodist Church.

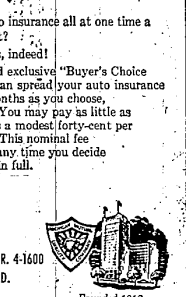
Russell Waack represented the club and presented the troop with a 50-star flag.
