Plan Development of 12 Homes In 33-Acre Frank Knight Estate

Thomas A. Duke, president of Estates Incorporated, has announced the acquisition by his firm of the Frank J. Knight Estate in Farmington Township. The 33-acre estate will be the site for a 12-home development to be known as Forestbrook Estates, according to Duke.

Located on Drake Road north of Grand River, the Knight property is surrounded by a high, cyclone fence for privacy which, along with the main entrance and service entrance, will be retained.

The terrain is exceptionally rolling and there are several acres of well kept private orchards, a reflection pond and numerous small buildings.

THE ROADS will remain private and the main entrance will be used only for residents' vehicles, Duke stated.

Lot sites will be priced from \$6,000 to \$15,000.

The main family home is situated on a high point of the estate and is a one level ranch. The home offers a beautiful screened summer house and a connecting guest house with a

huge family room. There is also a four-car garage barn and a four-car horse barn on the main house.

Duke states that this is not a large development as lot sizes in the subdivision will be very large in size, offering the opportunity for a few people to have all benefits, privacy and beauty of estate living.

EACH LARGE building site will have an exceptional point of its own.
