Attending the four-day meeting from this area were Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kramer and Pastor and Mrs. Walter Rutkowski of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Mr. Kramer attended as the Lutheran Home representative of the South East Michigan LLL District and Pastor W. Rutkowski as Pastoral Advisor of the same district.

More than 8,000 persons attended the opening convention rally on July 10, in the Minneapolis Municipal Auditorium at which Dr. Oswald Hoffman, speaker on the international Lutheran Hour, cited some of his experiences in a recent visit to Europe, Russia, and Poland.

THE CONVENTION closed with a banquet on July 13, in the Lexington Hotel, convention headquarters. The Rev. Dr. Richard R. Caemmerer of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, spoke on the convention theme, "Worship God and Rejoice in Christ Jesus."

Harry G. Barr, Fort Smith, Ark., businessman was elected president of the 115,000 member organization to succeed Adolph W. Herrmann of New Orleans.

Children four to eight years of age will hear animal stories told by Mrs. Adaline Jamieson of Farmington, and a nursery will be in session for younger children.

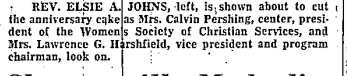
## Rites Held for W. B. Gambee

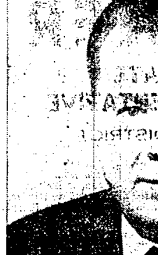

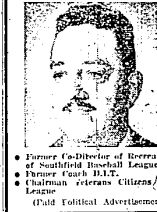
