Girls Operate Kendallwood Nursery Unit

The Kendallwood nursery centers are operated by the "Girls of Kendallwood" and are sponsored by the "Women of Kendallwood." Children of preschool age are cared for each morning, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon at a charge of 50 cents a child per day or 75 cents a day for two children from the same family.

Children can be brought to the home of Mary Trebble, 3270 Heartstone, or to the home of Lillian Axelsson, 32610 Heartstone. The "Girls of Kendallwood" members are 15 years and older, and are all experienced baby sitters. This is their first money-making venture for their treasury.

A percentage of the money earned will go directly to the treasury, the rest will be held in trust for the girls who do the sitting. They will receive their money in a lump sum in the middle of August.
