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Timely Tips on GARDENING

SHASTA DAISIES
Daisies are a flower known to all. Their name, which comes from ancient Anglo-Saxon, means "Day's eye." Indeed these flowers with their sun-bright centers surrounded by glistening white petals are as fresh and cheerful as a summer morning.

Although farmers regard them as weeds, the field daisy is beloved by children and is a welcome sight to passing motorists. This common daisy is the parent of the shasta daisy. Shastas are larger and more elegant than their prototype and are available with a wide variety of petal forms.

These hardy perennials are a valuable addition to the flower border. A profusion of large white flowers are borne on strong, sturdy, two to four foot stems. Bloom may be had from May until frost. Some varieties have bright orange centers, others yellow. Some have flat petals arranged in a single row, or in a double overlapping row. Others are twisted and quilled. A few are so double as to resemble round pompoms.

Shasta daisies form mounds of white blossoms that provide a look of crisp coolness during the hottest days of summer. They contrast beautifully with the vibrant pinks and reds of phlox, and are interesting played against the grasses, foliage and yellow trumpets of hemerocallis hyperion. The large masses of white they provide help to blend all of the bright colors of summer perennials into a harmonious picture.

SHASTA DAISIES are of easy culture, and are very hardy. They prosper in rich soils and must have a sunny location. The clumps increase in size rapidly, and if they are lifted and divided every two years the plants will remain more compact and flowers will be larger. An occasional application of fertilizer will give

rewards and a light application of time in spring is beneficial. For bloom to continue over a long period, faded blossoms must be removed. Shasta daisies have good lasting qualities when used as a cut flower, and are charming in informal bouquets. Calling for indoor use will also help prolong and increase bloom.

Majesty is one of the favorite varieties with single petals. Flowers are five to six inches in diameter, and stems are up to thirty inches tall. It is hardy and vigorous, withstanding adverse conditions well.

Charming is another single type with immense flowers and strong, stiff stems.

Alaska is an old, dependable variety. Flowers are a bit smaller than in the newer varieties, but are produced in great abundance on two foot stalks.

Mount Shasta is a double form that opens to a pure white pom-pom. Alyssa gives a dainty, fringed effect with its double flowers. It grows only eighteen inches high.

As foliage yellows on iris and oriental poppies it may be cut off. Do not feed roses, azaleas, and other shrubs after the end of July or tender new growth will be produced that will not have time to harden before winter and it will die back.

Perennials and annuals will benefit from an application of quick acting liquid fertilizer. Spray poison by with 24D or 245T or if near other plants that might be damaged use ammonium sulfate or amino-trimale which will not harm.

Order Madonna Lily bulbs for August planting. Do weeding and other necessary garden chores in the early morning and early evening when temperatures are not so high.
