
ELECTION LAW, ACT 116, P.A. 1954

SECTION 226. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continuously open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in-line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

Re-Modelling Completed At Farmington Cleaners

Farmington Cleaners, 32725 Grand River, has recently undergone a substantial remodeling program and has emerged not only with an attractive new store front but also with a drive-in window to serve customers who don't wish to take the time or effort to park.

One of the most complete cleaning establishments in the entire northwest suburban area, Farmington Cleaners has its own plant to handle all cleaning and laundering right on the premises. In addition, such services as fur storage, weaving, general repairs and alterations are available to local customers.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter (Rene and Elizabeth) look over the reins of the cleaning establishment in 1944 and did all the work themselves at that time. Now they head a work force of ten people who carry on the busy operation. Mrs. Carter says that she and her husband still put in long hours, usually 50 or 60 a week, as there is no short cut to getting the work out as promised despite the most modern equipment utilized in the plant.

AFTER BUILDING their business up from a smaller building into their present quarters in 1951 and have gradually added employees as the increasing load demanded. The modernization program got underway in the spring and was completed just two weeks ago.

Mrs. Carter said that she and her husband had been considering the drive-in facility for some time and that when the decision was made to go ahead with it, they also decided to remodel the entire front section of the building.

In addition to the drive-in window and the attractive store front, both inside and outside, they have also remodelled the large outdoor sign.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter live in the City of Farmington at 23077 Mayfield, just around the corner from their business establishment. They are long time residents of the area and have watched as Farmington has grown by leaps and bounds.

They have three married children scattered around the country. One lives in Los Angeles and another in Dallas. Of the three, only son William has followed their footsteps in the dry cleaning business. William lives in Novi and operates the DeBart House of Cleaning there.

AND MRS. CARTER entered their dry cleaning enterprise under somewhat unusual circumstances.

In 1944, a doctor had advised Mr. Carter to take it easy so the couple decided to go into the cleaning business with Mrs. Carter, who had been in the business since 1930, at the helm and her husband as a semi-active assistant.

However, the challenge of the business and the excellent benefits of it, then new sulphur dials seemed to put the man of the house into top form. He started right off working long and hard and continues to do so today and he never felt better, says Mrs. Carter.


Rogers Trains At Fort Slocum



The general membership meeting of the South Farmington Civic Association, Inc., was held July 21 at the Wheeler Street Fire Hall.

Committee plans for the forthcoming Horse Show sponsored by the Civic Association and the Clarenceville Church scheduled for Saturday, September 10 on the grounds at the rear of Bondford Inn were made known and it is anticipated this event will attract a goodly number of residents in this and surrounding areas.

Following an interesting report on the activities of the Farmington Little League Baseball for Boys, the membership voted to donate \$25.00 to this worthwhile project.

In order that the residents may be better informed regarding the proposed Constitutional Convention issue, a special meeting is planned for the near future with George Jomney as guest speaker. The public and any organized group in the area is cordially invited to attend.

THE LAST MEETING of the Association was devoted to the condition of the roads in the area. Final tabulations of ballots cast by the membership showed 45% in favor of special assessment districts, 32%, 1 mill levy; 14% retain present set-up, and 11% miscellaneous suggestions. At the request of a property owner Norman Peterson, president of the association, informing the members of the present status of the proposed water system for the "dry area."

VA Eases Rules On Med. Exams

Veterans 65 and older will find procedures to establish disability for pension purposes much simpler under new Veterans Administration regulations announced this week.

Gene A. Robens, Manager of VA's Regional Office in Detroit said today that VA is no longer required to examine veterans 65 and older who submit adequate medical statements from private physicians. Even in cases of younger veterans who are bed-bound or unable to travel because of serious illness, VA may now rate the claim on the basis of a private physician's statement if it is sufficiently complete and conforms to accepted medical procedures with necessary X-ray and laboratory reports.
