Recently, a subdivision was quite upset because the actual cost to them of the sewer they had petitioned for was somewhat higher than they had thought it was going to be when they signed the petition.

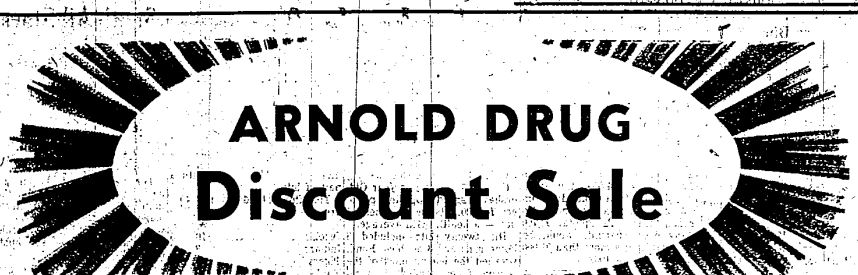
Sue Mandulak Visits Campus
