A regular meeting of the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, was held at the Township Hall in said Township on July 28th, A.D. 1960. Meeting was called to order at 8:06 P.M., Eastern Standard Time, by Mr. Curt Hall, Chairman.

PRESENT: Hall, Cairns, Avery, Brown, Bassette, Hug, Wilcox, Mr. Bassette and Mr. Fusco, representing the Planning Board, and Dr. Broadman were also present. Mr. Joseph P. Brennan, Municipal Attorney, was unable to be present.

Minutes of previous meeting, held June 28th, 1960, read by Clerk and stand approved as read.
MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Avery, that the Township Board tentatively accept the request for SDV License to be located at 31529 Thirteen Mile Road, until we receive the SDV License from the Liquor Control Commission in respect to the measurement and a positive statement that the property is proper distance from the school. Carried, unanimous.

Letter from the Liquor Control Commission, dated June 24th, 1960, requesting permission for SDV License for location at Orchard Lake and Thirteen Mile Road, South of A&P Store, Mr. Cairns will write the Liquor Control Commission requesting a definite address for this location.
Mr. Cairns read letter from Jerry Lowrance, thanking the Township Board for sponsoring him at Boys' State.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Cairns, that we follow the recommendation of the Planning Board with respect to replat of Glen Acres No. 2 Subdivision, Section 2, Final Hard-back Plat, and approve this Final Plat. Carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Wilcox, that we follow the recommendation of the Township Board with respect to Lincolnshire Subdivision, Final Plat, Section 24, Prints No. 1, 2 and 3, and approve this Final Plat. Carried, unanimous.

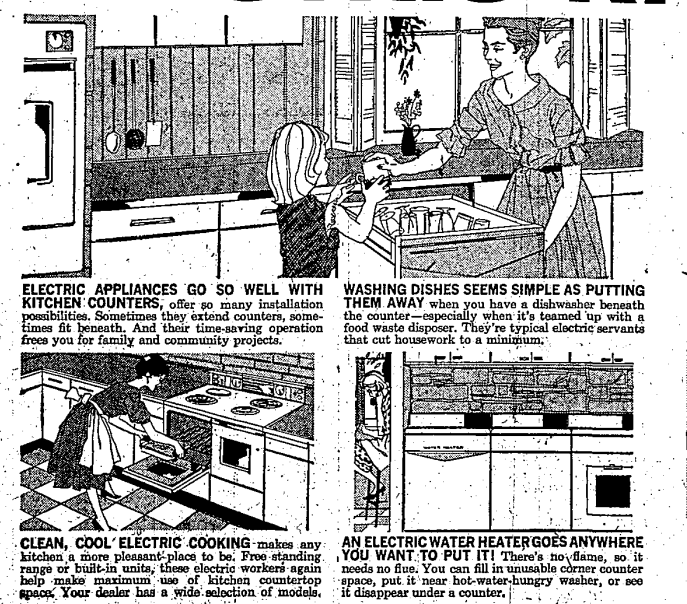
