Two of the three other children in the car were injured slightly, according to city police.

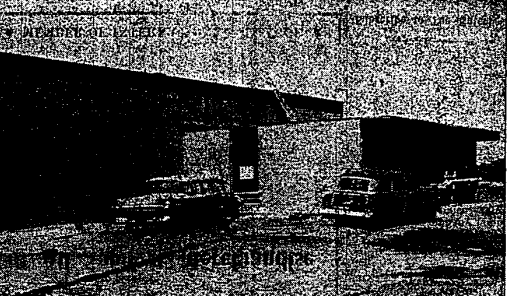

C'ville Makes Policy Changes

Substitute teachers in the Clarenceville School District who fill in for a prolonged period of time will receive daily compensation of \$22 beginning this September by action of the School Board at its last regular meeting. The previous rate had been \$20.

Tourist Trade Involves Year-Around Hard Sell

Michigan's Tourist Attractions are the product for a year-around hard-sell campaign.

The Michigan Tourist Council, all the media of communications plus numerous general information techniques to promote the state's vacation spots both within the state and throughout the nation.

And the council gets good cooperation from commercial groups within the state.

The Council divides its commercial, advertising, program into three parts to coincide with the three major vacation seasons in the state: winter, spring, summer and autumn.

Advertisements, timed to exert the greatest possible sales influence just prior to the time when vacationers make their plans for each season are placed with magazines, newspapers and radio-television.

Michigan's tourism is an informative and attractive literature is also prepared by the Council.

THE WHOLE package is aimed at helping people pick the right spot for their vacation from among the practically numberless recreation facilities in Michigan.

In addition to the advertising that is bought and paid for, the Council prepares new-type sales releases and pictures that are passed out to newspapers, magazines, radio and TV.

Underlying the whole program is a personal-contact public relations program that has two major purposes.

First, it must keep in touch with resort operators, tourist agencies and vacation spots so they can best take advantage of the Council program, and second, it must continually deal with potential users of Michigan's vacation spots and stimulate renewed and expanded interest.

This part of the Council's program includes a whole range of appearances at outdoor and travel shows, both in Michigan and out of state; personal service information dispensed by mail and in vacation brochures with vacationers and potential vacationers; contacts with transportation companies, industries, wholesalers and retail firms and social and professional organizations; showing of films and giving of lectures on Michigan attractions, and preparation of public relations announcements by radio and TV.

IN ADDITION, the public relations part of the program involves participation in tourist industry improvement programs.

"Distinguished Looking Paul Adams, the Michigan Attorney General, recently completed a task that a shy man might have shunned.
