And the fraudulent gimmicks used keep pace with the huge profits by the use of the principal organizations using door-to-door salesmen in this business.

You may be told that your house has been selected as a neighborhood model to be photographed and advertised, and you will be paid \$100 for each new siding job acquired as a result of this advertising. Thus, your siding job will cost you

## Coffee Making Secrets Simple, Here They Are

It's amazing — we Americans like coffee, but yet it takes the entire yearly crop of one coffee tree to make one pound of coffee. And this popular imported beverage costs us only pennies a cup.

Once you know how to make really excellent coffee, you've acquired an art. Yet the secrets of making good coffee are simple:

1. Use fresh ingredients, fresh water and fresh coffee of the right grind for your coffee pot. Use a vacuum-style coffee maker or use either fine or drip grind. Coffee for a crowd is easy with instant coffee. You can figure on about 4 cups of coffee from 2 cups of jar. The cost is about the same per cup as for brewed coffee.

When you make instant coffee in quantity, just be sure to reserve one generation — always add the water to the coffee. Empty the jar of coffee into a large coffee server. Then, allowing 4 quarts of water for each 2 ounces of instant coffee, measure the water and heat it to boiling. Let stand until bubbling stops. Pour the water slowly over coffee in coffee server. Let steep over low heat a few moments before serving. The flavor tends to mellow as coffee steeps.

Demitasse is a famous after-dinner coffee served in very small (demitasse) cups. Usually demitasse is taken black, but it's perfectly proper to serve cream and sugar for guests who may not like coffee black.

To make demitasse, make strong instant coffee in a coffee server, using 2 1/2 teaspoons instant coffee to each 4 cup (6 ounces) water. Or make brewed coffee, using 1/2 to 3/4 level tablespoons of ground coffee for each 4 cup water.

Cafe Au Lait is a popular coffee-milk drink that comes from France by way of New Orleans. Make strong coffee for demitasse. Heat an equal amount of milk. Pour the coffee over the milk. Add sugar to coffee cup or mug for serving. For a delightful party snack, serve with glazed doughnuts.

The illustrated booklet offers recommendations for achieving the problem of arthritis quickly and about the entire growing menace of health nostrums. It concludes with six "warnings" to do to avoid being taken by fraudulent promoters and their schemes.

## Young Mothers Endure Period Of Depression

Many a young mother of a first baby goes through a period of postnatal depression that begins the moment she comes home from the hospital.

Once home, she realizes she no longer can depend upon the nurses, doctors and other hospital workers who hovered over her to give advice, comfort and security. She is now on her own and she's scared, bewildered and overcome by the great responsibility she faces.

Some mothers quickly snap out of this "blues" period. Many, however, do not and go on to become what doctors call, "rigid mothers."

A DEPTH STUDY we conducted of the nation's diaper service industry shows the "rigid mother" as the nervous and tense mother who becomes worked up and upset while taking care of her baby. To bolster her own self-confidence, she becomes unusually strict with herself and her baby.

The study found such a mother holds to rigid feeding schedules, forced and early toilet training, early weaning and no thumb sucking. She takes her responsibilities seriously and because she's anxious about them, she occasionally resents them. This causes her to feel guilty and believe she isn't doing her job right.

If you are a young mother or a young mother-to-be, here are some pointers developed by baby care consultants of the diaper service industry:

1. "Know what you're facing." You can't prepare for all emergencies, but you can eliminate a great deal of worry over trifles.

2. Attend pre-natal classes in your community.

3. IF NO STUDY classes are available, then discuss your fears and worries with your doctor.

4. Don't try to learn everything about child care. "Practice each new problem as it arises."

5. First, find out what you have to know to keep your baby healthy and contented.

6. Don't wear yourself out with unnecessary chores. Do important things first.

7. Take advantage of all labor-saving services such as preparing baby foods and diaper service.

8. Learn to budget your time so you don't get that harassed feeling that time is running out.

9. FIT YOUR WORK and leisure schedule into your baby's schedule. Cooking, cleaning and laundering should be done while baby is napping.

10. Get plenty of rest. When you're tired and irritable, baby also will be fretful.

11. Take at least one nap while baby is asleep.

12. Use baby's feeding time to relax. Choose a comfortable chair and hold baby in your arms while you feed him.
