Cornerstone Ceremony Held By K-C Council

Cornerstone laying ceremonies were held August 11, for St. Francis Hall, being erected at 21900 Middlebelt Rd., Farmington, by St. Francis Council No. 4401, Knights of Columbus. Grand Knight Nicholas Wyles (Southfield), and Deputy Grand Knight Cecil L. Harris presided. The ceremony was broken for the 10:00 o'clock Clubhouse July 6, and construction progress is a full week ahead of schedule, according to James A. Mason (Lakewood Village), the Council's Building Corporation President. Plans include a four and one-half foot marble statue of St. Francis of Assisi, patron of the Council, to be installed in niche on the face-brick front of the building. The floor of the foyer will contain a greatly-enlarged exact reproduction of the Knights of Columbus emblem in ceramic tile, surrounded by polished marble. Completion and dedication of the building is scheduled for November 15.
