Mrs. Bronson To Attend MEA Fall Meeting

Mrs. Ada Bronson of Farmington will attend the annual fall meeting of the Michigan Education Association's board of directors, commissions and committees at the MEA Building, Lansing, August 26 and at the MEA Camp near Battle Creek, August 27.

More than 100 educators from all over the state are expected to attend the conference of the fifth largest educational association in the nation.

These representatives, both teachers and administrators, make up the 18-member board of directors, four standing committees and seven standing commissions that chart the direction and evaluate progress of the association.

THE BOARD will make appointments to commissions and committees and hear reports from the latter on such activities as the organization of the MEA Insurance Corporation, plans for the MEA building and constitutional revision.

Presiding at the two-day meeting will be Dr. Fred J. Voces, associate professor of education, Michigan State University, MEA president. Also attending will be Dr. E. Dale Kennedy, MEA executive secretary; George N. Lauer, registrar, Central Michigan University, MEA president-elect; and members of the MEA executive staff.

Select Foods To Be Frozen

Some fruits and vegetables freeze well, others don't. In order to make the best use of your freezer, you should be choosy about the foods you freeze.

Green peppers, for instance, can be frozen, but they will be limp when thawed. So, plan to use them next winter in cooked dishes, but don't count on them for crisp winter salads.

Foods high in water content, such as tomatoes, celery, cabbage, cucumbers and lettuce are no good freezer materials. Fruits and vegetables that do freeze well include corn, green beans, asparagus, broccoli, peas, strawberries, raspberries, peaches, blueberries and melons.

Freeze melons now for next winter appetizers, salads or desserts. For your Christmas dinner's "red-and-green" first course, serve sweet juice watermelon and honey dew melon cubes.

TO FREEZE watermelon, select a firm, fleshless melon. Cut watermelon into cubes or balls. Pack into freezer containers and cover with cold syrup made in the proportion of 1 cup sugar to 2 cups water. Leave 1/2 to 1 inch headspace for expansion. Label and date the package and freeze at 0 degrees.

Honeydew, cantalopes, crenshaw, casabas, and Persian melons may also be frozen, using the same method as suggested above. For variety, freeze several kinds of melon in each package.

When you shop for watermelon or muskmelon, remember that a large whole melon need not be too much if you freeze the part that is not eaten fresh.

Check the background color, not the blush, when you buy a fresh peach. Home economists say some peach varieties "blush" with red color more than others, but all peaches develop a yellow or whitish background when they are ripe. A dominant green background color suggests the peach was picked too soon and may never fully ripen.
