Young Bowlers Get Set for Coming Season

The approaching fall season is a signal to the youth of the area that the bowling season is now and each year, in increasing numbers, the youngsters are flocking to the local establishments.

In last year's Detroit Bowling Proprietors' sponsored tournament, young people from Farmington, Livonia and Farmington areas swept most of the honors in both the boys and girls classes.

At Farmington, programs for youngsters are available at Norwest, Bel-Aire and Farmington Lanes and they will start during September.

A TYPICAL PROGRAM has been developed at Farmington Lanes with leagues available for both boys and girls from 8 to 15 years old. The youngsters are enrolled in the American Junior Bowling Congress so that they may have the many benefits available.

The boys leagues are on Saturday and these leagues are divided both by age and experience. Leagues for girls are available after school during the week with junior and senior high girls bowling in separate leagues.

Highlights of the league's benefits include reduced bowling rates, free bowling shirts, trophies, instruction and supervision and many activities such as a father-son tournament, are conducted during the year.

THE LEAGUES are conducted in a similar manner as adult leagues but the bowling costs have been reduced to less than half the adult league costs.

The management of the bowling establishments in the area are in urging parents to have their interested youngsters join a junior league so that they may take advantage of the excellent programs available.

Youngsters with little or no bowling experience are especially welcomed by the bowling establishments.

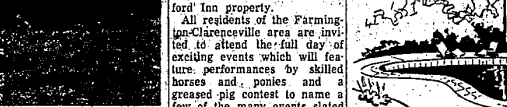
Lifeguards are on duty at both Martindale and Maple beaches where facilities include food service, rest rooms, bath house and first aid stations.
