Teachers Will Meet Sept. 6, 7

Although classes in the Farmington public school system will not start until Thursday, Sept. 8, teachers will be back to the old grind two days earlier.

All new teachers will report to the schools they have been assigned to Tuesday morning, Sept. 6, at 8 a.m. At 8:30 other teachers returning from last year will also report to the schools they will be teaching in.

General meetings will be held in each of the schools.

From 11:30 until 12:30 p.m. luncheons will be held at each of the schools and at 12:45 teachers and administrators from all of the schools will report at Farmington Senior High for a general staff meeting. This meeting will last until 2 p.m.

Asst. Superintendent Marjorie VanAmeyde will preside with a special message to be given by Sept. 6, V. V. Johnson.

From 2 until 2:30 p.m., there will be a social period with refreshments being served by the school system's credit union.

Secondary school personnel will have departmental meetings from 2:30 to 3:30 and elementary personnel will have curriculum meetings.

On Wednesday teachers will also be expected at their respective schools at 8 a.m.

General meetings will be held in the elementary schools in the morning with teachers being allowed the afternoon to prepare their classrooms for youngsters on Thursday morning.

Want Change in Ditch Routing

Attorney Robert Kelly informed the City Council Monday night that he had made a check, as they had requested, and found that the ditch cutting across the northeast corner of the city was not a designated county drain.

The owner of the low property which the ditch cuts across in the corner of Moral Park subdivision recently filled in the natural drainage ditch and re-routed it.

Councilmen expressed strong dissatisfaction with the way the ditch was re-routed feeling that considerable trouble was going to be caused because of it.

It was agreed that the owner should be required to open the ditch up again along a more logical route and that a covered ditch probably should be required. Attorney Kelly was instructed to take necessary action to see that this is done.

OUR LADY of Sorrows Catholic schools will enroll 1229 this Fall. There will be 840 grade school children attending the parochial school and 370 high school students.

Grade school pupils will report for classes Wednesday, Sept. 7. Juniors and seniors in the high school will also report on Wednesday at 9 a.m. After classification and a run through of the scheduling students will be given time to purchase books and pay fees. The same procedure will be followed by freshmen and sophomores on Thursday.

All high school students will report to their regular classes on Friday.

ST. PAUL'S Lutheran school will open its doors for final registration on Tuesday, September 6. There are presently 143 pupils enrolled to attend grades 1 through 8 at this school.

Special devotional services will be held at 10 a.m. on Wednesday to officiate at the new-school year. Following the service regular classroom sessions will be held. Buses will not pick up students on Wednesday morning but will return them home Wednesday afternoon.

Principal of the school again this year is Edward Winter. A new teacher on the staff is Miss Judy Schaeffer of Minnesota. Donald, Scheek and Danial Thode are the other two teachers.

New Engineer Idea Rejected

A motion by Councilman Howard Thayer seconded by Hugo Peterson calling for the releasing of Francis Papke as the city's consulting engineer and the hiring of another to replace him lost for lack of support. Thayer's contention was that Papke, former full-time city engineer who left to take a job with a private engineering firm, was not doing a satisfactory job as a consultant. Peterson was in agreement but the other three Council members were not.

Councilman V. O. Bates stated that he felt until a new city manager is appointed the city should continue to utilize Papke's services because of his knowledge of city engineering problems.

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
