Hill-Dale Plan Flower Show

The Hill and Dale Garden Club wishes to extend a cordial invitation to everyone to attend their second flower show called "The Look of Fashion" on September 16, 1960 between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m. at St. Fabian's Church, West Twelve Mile Road near Power.

The design division is called "Facets of Fashion" and has nine classes in it. Class 1 "Picture of Loveliness" is open to advanced flower arrangers and is not to be judged. Class 2 "Touch of Luxury" is a tray setting for breakfast in bed. Class 3 "Look of the Season" is an arrangement of fruits and vegetables and/or flowers.

Class 4 "Taking a Chance on Beauty" is the class open to novices featuring zinnias, marigolds or gladioli. Class 5 "Simply With Style" is a challenging arrangement using just three flowers and greens. Class 6 "Evening Enchantment" is using one or more candles as part of the arrangement.

CLASS 7 "Accessories Add Glamour" is going to be a crysanthemum arrangement using one or more accessories. Class 8 "Casual Elegance" will be an informal buffet table for four. Class 9 "Little American Beauty" is a small child's table with chairs set for two for any occasion the exhibitor wishes.

The horticultural division called "Manicured Perfection" is open to the public. All exhibitor; preference will be given named varieties. One bloom, stem, spray or stalk will be required for specimen blooms; three specimens each for small fruits or vegetables and one specimen each for large fruits or vegetables.

Potted plants and decorative planters must have been in exhibitor's possession for at least one month. Containers for all except potted plants and decorative planters will be furnished by committee. This show will be judged by the Standard System.

Mrs. Russell Lenz is chairman of the show. She, together with her committee, has had a busy summer getting it organized.
