Forest Hills Church Opens New Sanctuary

The congregation of the Forest Hills United Methodist Church will move into their new sanctuary at 20823 W. Twelve Mile Road on September 11. The Sunday school will begin at 10:00 and morning worship at 11:00; this new time of morning services will become regular.

The new sanctuary seats 425 people exclusive of the three nurseries and the children's church. The decking and laminated arches are emphasized by unique lighting of chandeliers. Pews are of lined oak with cushions in antique white. The prayer altar is backed by steps set between organ and piano platforms.

The sanctuary carries a sense of restfulness and peace by its subdued tones of brown blending in the woods of ceiling and pews and carpeted aisle and chancel. Choir sections face each other behind the organ and piano platforms. The acoustical qualities in the building make speaking easy without use of microphones.

FOYER WALLS ARE of stone and plaster combination. The upstairs also houses the church office, the pastor's study, a crib nursery, a prayer room and the choir room. The Sunday school section already in use makes room for as many as 800 scholars in the church school.

The former church building will be remodeled to serve as church annex and youth center. The new building is the third building erected by the congregation in a ten year period.

Mr. and Mrs. William Thomas of Vero Beach, Florida will host an afternoon homecoming and open house at the church at 2:00. Many musical features will highlight the five services of the day. Timely Tips on GARDENING

FALL PLANTING SCHEDULE
of bloom. Annuals, however, are at their most colorful. Now, before the Fall planting season arrives, is a good time to survey the garden situation.

Were the flower beds as colorful as had been anticipated, and was there a successful display for this season? Perhaps some perennials had an early flowering and the others followed in the season. After the leaves assume their autumn hues and start to fall, these deciduous plants can safely be moved. Root growth will continue until the ground is solidly frozen and the plants are dormant. This becomes well established by the time leaves begin to grow in Spring.

Broadsided evergreens and thin-barked trees such as birch and dogwood are best planted in Spring. Winter freezing can cause extensive splitting of the bark on newly planted trees with this bark.

Perennials can be planted during the month of September. New beds can be planted. Old beds reworked. Plants will have adequate time to become established, and will make good root growth in the cool, fall weather. A light mulch applied after the ground freezes will prevent the new plants from heaving from alternate freezing and thawing.

SPRING FLOWERING bulbs must be planted in Fall. The small bulbs that are the earliest harbingers of Spring are the first to be planted in the Fall. All need time to grow before the ground freezes. They are planted only a few inches below the surface and growth begins when the first freezing weather comes. Conversely, as soon as thawing commences in Spring they begin pushing up the leaves and flower buds. Crocuses, scilla, snow drops, and chionodoxa should be planted in early September.

Late September and early October is planting time for bulbs and all types of daffodils and narcissus. Species tulips should be planted early in October, but May flowering tulips should be planted from mid-October until the ground is frozen.

Hardy lilies need Fall planting, too. Bulbs of early blooming varieties such as Madonna lilies are available for planting in August and September. Others, that bloom later in the season, may be planted and are not ready to be planted until very late autumn.

Grass, too, can now be sown. New lawns can be seeded, or old lawns repaired. The warm days remaining in summer will favor germination of the seed, and cool, damp Fall days following will favor growth of the tender new grass plants.
