The Michigan State Fire Prevention Association will assist the Farmington Kiwanis Club and the Department of Public Safety Tuesday, September 20, in its statewide fire safety campaign.

The Association is comprised of stock fire insurance company fieldmen who contribute their time and services on a voluntary basis in an effort to help bring down the huge fire toll in Michigan each year.

The inspectors will work in pairs and singly, accompanied by Department of Safety personnel and boy scouts as they call upon business establishments and visit schools, churches and other public buildings in an attempt to discover and help eliminate fire hazards.

Immediately following the inspection tours, post cards will be sent to building owners and occupants so that they may report the corrections they have made, if corrections were recommended by the inspectors, to the Michigan State Fire Prevention Association.

Some 15 to 20 inspectors are expected to participate in this campaign. They will meet for dinner at 11:30 a.m. following the inspection.

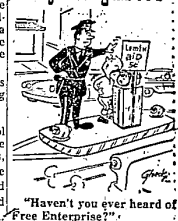

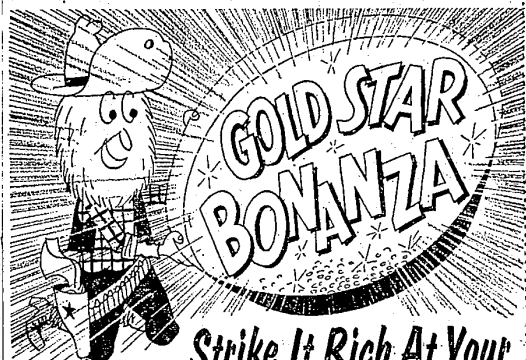

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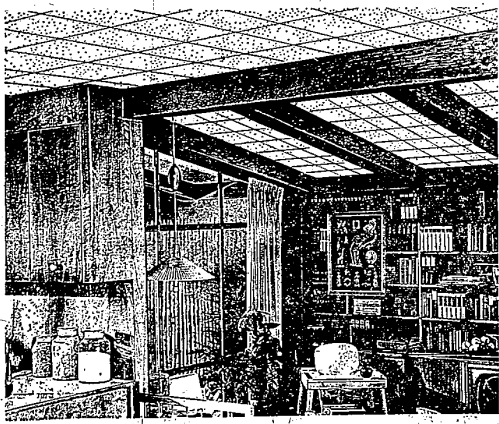
