Bill Broomfield Says Dems. for Fed. Control

Congressman William S. Broomfield (R., 18th district) last week accused the Democratic party of trying to "take the federal government into a Big Daddy who will take care of us all."

Broomfield told a crowd of 2,000 at an anti-union Labor Day rally that the Democrats "have confidence in only one thing... massive government intervention which whittles individual rights, turns every man and his family into a subject for state control."

"I can't buy that," Broomfield declared, "neither can the American people. Our strength is in our freedom, in our individuality, in our independence, in an all-powerful government."

The Royal Oak lawmaker, who shared the platform with GOP gubernatorial candidate Paul D. Biggwell and Rep. Alvin M. Bentley, GOP candidate for the U.S. Senate, lashed out at Sen. J. Edgar Hoover at his Labor Day appearance in Detroit.

"One of the cockers' cut loose by the imperialistic war," Broomfield said, "the Russian economy is growing at a three times the rate of ours," Broomfield said.

"He might have mentioned several other countries. The Congo is growing at a rate of 26 percent a year, for instance," according to Sen. Kennedy's dubious logic, we are in danger of the Congo overtaking us and passing us in productive capacity," Broomfield said.

"Lacking Kennedy's reasoning," sheer nonsense," Broomfield pointed out that the U.S. gross national product totaled \$500 billion in 1959, to the Soviet Union's \$200 billion.

"Sen. Kennedy cannot dispute this fact because it is a fact," he declared. "We are 19 years ahead of Russia in steel production, 22 years ahead in petroleum production, 52 years ahead in meat production."

Questioning the Democratic party's "right to control the nation," Broomfield took a slap at Kennedy's inability to "enact the proposals of his two-party platform with a one-party Democratic majority in Congress."

"We have seen how inept, how cynical, how greedy one political party can be," Broomfield said. "We have seen Democrats reject their own party because they couldn't stomach the deals, the rejection of principle for expediency which is so much a part of the Democratic platform and those who are in control today."

The Republican party, Broomfield contended, wants "government to help you and your family toward freedom and independence, not throw roadblocks in your path."
