Motorcyclists Set for Races At Wolverine

The Detroit Area Associated Motorcycle Clubs, in conjunction with the Wolverine Club of Livonia is promoting the second Tri-State championship motorcycle race in as many years, the Wolverine Harrow Raceway, Schoolcraft and Middlebelt Roads, Livonia, on Sunday, September 25th.

Cream of the crop of the motorcycle racing fraternity in the mid-west will be on hand along with top riders from other parts of the country. \$1,700 in prize money will be on hand along with drawing these riders to the Livonia track along with the desire to be crowned champion of Michigan, Ohio and Indiana on the half-mile oval. Contestants are divided into three groups, novice, amateur and expert. Each class will have two elimination races, with the fastest four men in each heat moving up into the final event in their respective classes. The eight fastest expert riders from the tri-state area will qualify for the championship event.

Some 60 to 75 riders are expected to qualify for positions. Workouts begin at 10:30 a.m., with qualifying scheduled for 12:00 noon. The first race will get underway at 2:00 p.m. sharp.

Trojans Tied By Ypsi in Final Seconds of Game

The Clarencville Trojans exploded for two touchdowns in the first two minutes they had their hands on the ball against Ypsilanti in a last Friday night opener and then saw their opponent fight back climaxed by a desperation pass play in the last five seconds that tied the game at 18-18.

After kicking off to Ypsi to start the game the Trojans forced a punt and took over on their own 40. In the second play from scrimmage Bruce Furets burst over left tackle into the open and raced 63 yards for a score.

Clarencville's halfback, Ted, in their seats when the Trojans recovered a fumble and sent Ron Riddler over right tackle for another six pointer. Clarencville missed both tries for extra points but at that point in the game it looked as though this would make little difference. Ypsi came back with a touchdown and conversion before the half ended to knot the score at 17-17.

The Trojans 11 scored what proved to be the winning score down early in the third quarter after a fumble recovery deep in the Utica territory. Unks again was the sower one in the clutch. A Barth to end Tom Clark pass was good for the conversion. Another Lancer touchdown was nullified in the quarter due to an offside penalty.

The Lancers clinched the game early in the final period when freshman Rick Barth tied the St. Lawrence quarter back in his own end zone for a 2 point safety. The Lancers caught Unks in their own end, during the first minute due to a 5 point defense and the fine punting of Bill Zinger.
