City Council Proceedings

A special meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held on September 19, 1960, for the purpose of awarding bids on the Hawthorne Street Sanitary Sewer Bonds, Rezonning of Lot 54, Brookdale Subdivision and report re A & P Store.

Meeting was called to order at 7:35 P.M. by Mayor Pro-Tem B. A. Bates.

ROLL CALL: Bates, Brotherton, Peterson and Thayer present. Lindbergh absent.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: Clerk Quinn, Attorney Kelly, Consulting Engineer Papke and Chief DeVriendt.

A. Bids on Hawthorne Street Sanitary Sewer Bonds. Four (4) bids were opened and tabulated by the Clerk and placed on file. Motion made by Brotherton and supported by Thayer to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, do hereby award the contract for the construction of the Hawthorne Street Sanitary Sewer Bonds to the lowest bidder, as follows:

WHEREAS, September 19, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, has been set as the date and time for opening bids for the purchase of \$23,000.00 — 1960 Sanitary Sewer Bonds of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan;

AND WHEREAS, said bids have been publicly opened and read;

AND WHEREAS, the following bids have been received:

Bidder Kalkaska State Bank \$23,000.00

Kenower, MacArthur & Co. 22,022.10

McDonnell & Co. 23,041.11

Friday & Co. 23,001.00

AND WHEREAS, the bid of Kalkaska State Bank has been determined to produce the lowest interest cost to the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, do hereby accept the bid of Kalkaska State Bank, as above stated, and the same hereby is accepted.

Downtown Parking

way between Farmington Road and Power Road.

In January of 1958 the Council decided to get some expert advice as a guide to go by. They authorized Gray Associates, planning consultants, to proceed with a thoroughfare and downtown development plan. The city attorney was also instructed to examine existing ordinances regarding cleanliness around commercial establishments in the city. A downtown development plan was submitted to the Council by Gray Associates in July and turned over to the planning commission for use in future planning.

Just before the close of 1958 an off-street parking ordinance for the city was completed and discussed with businessmen about it started. In January of 1959 John Clappison, chairman of the off-street parking committee, submitted the committee's recommendations for an off-street parking plan. It was at this time that action was also taken by the Council calling for widening of Farmington Road from Nine Mile to Slocum with the expenses for so doing to be shared jointly by the city and county.

In July of 1959 Virgil Cornwell, builder and developer, appeared before the City Council to request that some city-owned land south of Grand River and east of Farmington Road be sold for commercial development. Two weeks later, John Clappison and Arthur Gerian, former city assessor, presented a map and plans for this proposed commercial development to the Council.

Aware that the downtown business district was in need of more good commercial enterprises as well as additional parking, the Council agreed to consider the proposal.

At this same meeting the city manager was instructed by the Council to prepare plans for off-street parking lots in each of the three sections of the downtown district where commercial enterprises are presently located. He was further instructed to outline possible methods of financing completion of such parking plans.

On August 10 a special public hearing was held at which time the proposal to acquire land and construct three off-street parking lots was discussed. Several comments were heard in favor of the proposed plans but there were also strong objections voiced by some in regard to the areas that had been included in the special assessment districts established to finance the total off-street parking project.

The latter part of August of last year, John Clappison, Robert Boile and Harry Lapham were named as a committee of three to work with the city manager in continuing to study off-street parking plans and methods of financing.

Action in September of last year resulted in a little bit of additional off-street parking downtown. An offer made by the Farmington Holding Co. to lease property between Harris Homestead House and Mac's 50 to \$5.00 for parking for a token \$5.00 fee for five years was gratefully accepted by the city. Authorization was also given the city manager to proceed in having this area (where the former old Owen House was located) blacktopped. This was done this summer at a cost of \$2,137.

It was on October 5, 1959, that the three member off-street parking committee and the city manager presented their proposal for the development and financing of Parking Area "A" in the southeast quadrant downtown. Instructions were given the committee at this time to begin on a similar study and plan for Parking Area "B."

(In a second article next week we will go into detail on how the Parking Area "A" project is being financed and how the City of Farmington Center Corporation are working in conjunction to fit the commercial development into the total southeast quadrant redevelopment plan.)

Bonds Sold for Sewer Project

Work on the laying of a sanitary sewer line for land owners on the east side of Hawthorne Street, between the corner of the city — should be underway very soon now.

At a special session Monday evening, the City Council passed a resolution authorizing the sale of \$23,000 worth of bonds to finance the project following the opening of bids for them.

Four bids were received. The lowest was made by the Kalkaska State Bank which agreed to buy the bonds at a 3 1/2 percent interest rate.

CITY ENGINEER Francis Papke informed the Council that he felt certain he would be able to get an advertisement for bids in the Dodge Report yet this week and that bids could be opened on September 30 if he was authorized to do this. This would make it possible for the Council to take action on the awarding of contracts at its regular October 3 meeting, he pointed out. Work could thus be started early in October, he added.

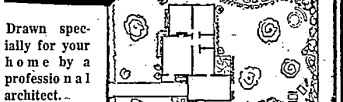
The Council agreed to this plan and authorized Papke to proceed. All property owners on the east side of Hawthorne presently have septic tanks since there is no sanitary sewer line.
