Guide To Beauty

Last week we touched on proper facial care. Now comes the fun part - application of make-up using the techniques of the Society of Make-Up Artists. The first step is not the make-up base, as you might expect. We begin with a before make-up cover. This is a creamy flesh colored stick which comes in a tube as easy to handle as lipstick. Stroke it on in one smooth sweep under the eyes to eliminate dark circles - and also for an over all skin tone, which is the foundation for a good make-up. This will also cover embarrassing skin blemishes, moles and shadowed areas. Smooth it on with a soft texture by patting or stippling with the fingertips until the edges are blended away. Note, please, the word "smooth". Nothing should ever be rubbed onto your face. Next, we're going to apply a liquid make-up base. But first, we must select the proper color. This is generally one or two shades darker than the skin tone. APPLY JUST A DOT to the forehead, on each cheek, nose and chin. Blend with fingertips or with a make-up sponge over the surface of the face upward and outward. One of our passwords is - "up and out" - and we urge you to keep this in mind when applying any product to your face. The base is now blended up into the hairline. We must never have "stop lines" anywhere. The studio make-up man says this is the most glaring make-up mistake a woman can make. Don't forget to apply the base to the eyelids and lips. Nothing is so rare as a smooth flawless make-up. The next step in the make-up procedure. We all need the flattery of rouge. Actually, natural color is usually uneven and cheeks need rouge for a smooth tone. Rouge should blend with your natural blush tone. Transfer a small amount of rouge to the middle finger - make an "apple" of your cheek by smiling broadly, then touch the rouge to the high points of the cheeks and blend smoothly up and out toward the temple. Rouge should never be applied within a finger's width of the eye - nor should it be applied any closer to the nose than the width of one finger. Place rouge only where natural coloring would appear. Always blend rouge to be concentrated on the center of your cheeks. After blending, it's important to look straight into your mirror to be sure the rouge is balanced on each cheek.

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
