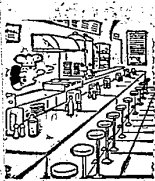

Library Conference Probes Needs of Community Branches

Dr. Harold C. Taylor, Director of the W. E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research, spoke before the Governor's Conference for Libraries last month on "Good Libraries - a Necessity, not a Luxury."

Mr. Taylor explained the process by which industrial accident judges a community long before the local Chamber of Commerce learns of their interest. An important consideration is the character of community personnel, which will be contained. The first index to community service is the public library, he said. If that is inadequate the scouts may be reasonably sure that other services, such as water, shopping facilities, street cleaning, fire protection and rubbish and garbage removal are also inadequate, he explained.

MR. TAYLOR MENTIONED

an attractive library building, we have that; trained staff, we have that; sufficient books - ah there's the rub. Farmington is second lowest in the State in the number of books per capita, for a Class 4 library, well under the minimum suggested by the American Library Association.

Farmington need not be behind in this requirement. An increased tax allotment would help but there will always be a need for private contributions to meet these specialized needs of business and industry, and to provide growing children with the reference books and the stimulation of varied reading matter which a good library makes possible.

Mr. Taylor mentions as a positive factor the ability of community groups to work together to improve community facilities. The Farmington

Friends of the Library provides the channel through which private citizens, businessmen, service clubs and other groups can raise our library to first place in the State. Our goal - 18,000 new books for our library this year.
