The Farmington Rocket Varsity last Saturday for the first time in three outings this season as South Redford swept by them, 28-0.

The Raiders scored twice in each period and registered additional quarters in the second and third quarters as the Rocket defense was unable to cope with the hard running Redford backs led by Mike Joyce.

JOYCE scored the first three Raider touchdowns on runs of 20, 24 and 20 yards. Bob Durant burst through the middle of the Farmington line and sped 25 yards for the final touchdown.

South Redford scored a best field by the game statistics which show that the Raiders' defense was an average 280 yards and 21 yards in passing and 21 yards in passing defense. The Farmington defense, Charles Besio and Dan Wolfmeyer, went out defensively for the first time in the game.
