



Schools Plan College Night Program Oct. 9

The eleventh annual College Night program will be held at Northville High School on Tuesday, October 9, from 7:10 p.m. to 9:15 p.m.

There will be two browsing periods, the first from 7:10 to 7:30, and the second from 8:00 to 8:15, during which guests may go from place to place to ask questions and obtain information. Then in the closed sessions, 7:30-8:10; 8:15-8:35; and 8:35-9:15, which are more formal, representatives from each college will give a brief talk and answer specific questions pertaining to the college they represent.

A PANEL DURING the closed sessions will talk and answer questions on selecting a college, entrance exams, financing, and college requirements. This panel will include Dr. MacLeod, moderator; William A. Wallace, Ass. Dir. of Adm. of Wayne State University; and representatives from Western State University, Alma College, and Flint Jr. College.

The four armed services will be represented: Air Force, Army, Marines, and Navy. Besides these, 21 colleges, business schools, trade schools, and universities will also be represented. These are: Adrian, Albion, Alma, Central Michigan, U. of Michigan, Wayne State U., and Western Michigan U.

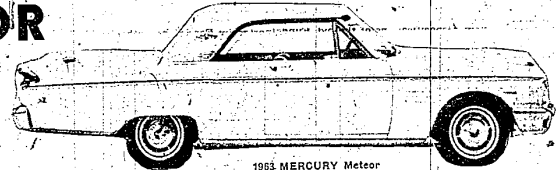

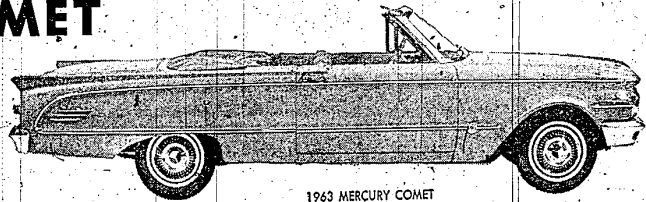

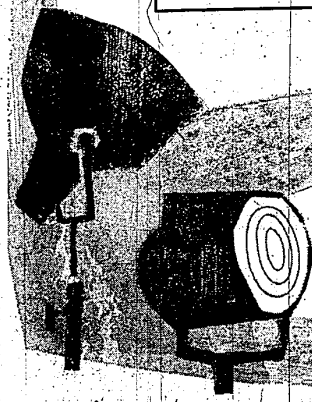
