

Builder Thomas A. Duke Opens New River Glen Apartments

With the announcement of the new 80 unit apartment River Glen, of Farmington, located in the heart of Farmington, Thomas A. 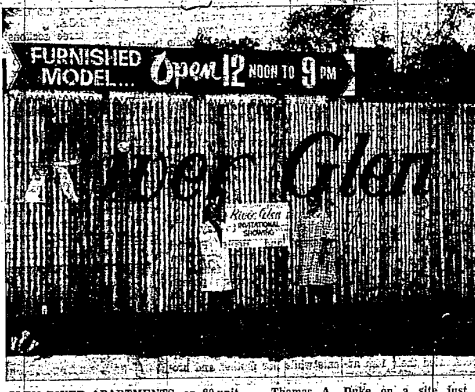
