Gilder's PAT Drops Vikings In FHS Clash

With stout determination and with spirited inspiration from the sidelines, the Farmington-Palmer football team unleashed its first potent offensive attack of the season and upended previously unbeaten Walled Lake last Friday by the score of 20-14.

The Falcons looked like an altogether different team than the one that appeared on the Waterford gridiron only one week earlier.

Behind 127 at the end of the third quarter, Farmington emerged victorious with two touchdowns in the final period. The winning margin was provided by the right foot of Mike Gilder as he booted two extra points.

The Vikings, defending Laker champs, were the overwhelming favorites to win. However, the Farmington gridiron had evidence not seen before of this before the game.

Walled Lake struck quickly as Tom Kaufman's opening kickoff returned to the Viking 40 yard line. In five plays the Lakers had themselves touchdown on Puarterback John Thomas' early scamper.

The Vikings scored once more on a five yard run by Dean Cherre, but once again the stalwart Falcon line blocked the extra point attempt. This made the halftime score 12-7.

The third quarter showed no scoring although Farmington took the lead on a 22 yard punt when time ran out.

It took just four plays into the final quarter for the Falcons to score again. Kaufman pitched a touchdown strike to sophomore Dick Johnson from the Viking 10 yard line. The punt was blocked, but Farmington led 13-12.

From then on it was the Falcon's game. With 5:37 left, Bill Freeman pulled his way into the end zone from three yards out. Gilder again added the extra point to make the score 20-12. A key play in this scoring drive was a spectacular 22 yard pass play from Kaufman to end Dale Pitcock putting the Falcons on the Walled Lake three yard line.

Walled Lake tallied once more on a 47 yard pass from Thomas to Steve Fischer, but even with the extra point conversion by Thomas the game still belonged to the Falcons.

After Farmington's Harry Walden pounced on the attempted end zone kickoff, time ran out on Walled Lake and the jubilant Falcons had their first victory of the season.

The leading ground gainers for Farmington were Freeman and Leach whose totals added together showed nearly 50 rushing yards.

This victory, coupled with the defeat to Waterford, elevated Farmington into a tie for third place in the Inter-Lakes. The standings are:

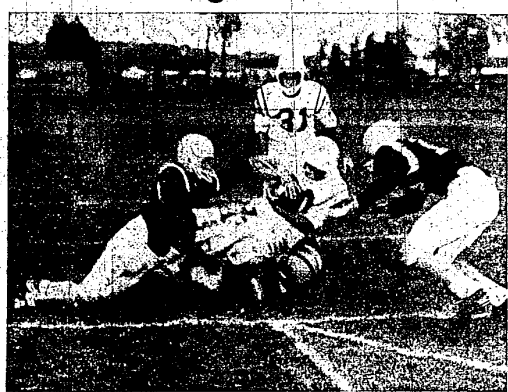
The clock showed 1:21 as the Falcons sent a halfback around the end for their first tally.

The Farmington cross country team is learning week by week that one great runner doesn't make a great team.

Last Saturday the harriers placed a dismal twelfth in the All-Oakland County Meet, held at Walled Lake. The meet was won by Birmingham Seaholm.

Dennis Hunt placed a very respectable fourth in the meet, but the rest of the team was far behind. Hunt's time for the two mile course was 10 minutes and 11 seconds. This is the fastest time ever recorded by a Farmington runner. The individual winner of the race was a Clarkston runner, who finished at 10:02. Although finishing fourth, Dennis was the first finisher of the Inter-Lakes teams.

Second for Farmington was Pete Sartin in 40th place at 11:09. Following him was John Lockwood in 57th with a time of 11:18. Larry Miller was next in 78th at 11:30, and Rick McGaw rounded out the scoring with 79th place in 11:38.

That fact that Berkley was the only Inter-Lakes team that placed in the top 100 was a disappointment to their school.

Rockets Unveil Passing Attack In 32-7 Defeat

An out-manned but fighting Rocket Varsity went down to their third defeat in four games last Saturday as the Lions from Dearborn rolled over them by a 32-7 count in a Little League football contest.

Dad's Day crowd had little to cheer about as the Lion juggernaut completely dominated the contest, scoring in each period.

Indicative of the depth of personnel of the Dearborn team was their spread of scoring talent as five players accounted for the five touchdowns registered by this big team. The Rockets were outwished an average of better than ten yards a man in the line and the Farmington forwards were consistently outcharged all afternoon.

SPINDOUTS For the hard pressed Rocket defense were Dan Wolfman, Mike Briolat and Ron Buckley in the secondary and Chuck Beiss and Bill Bliss in the line. Wolfman was particularly outstanding, making at least a half dozen touchdowns-saving tackles from his safety spot as the Rocket team experienced considerable difficulty in coping with the winged-T attack of the Lions.

The Farmington offense was inept against the superior Lions but did have one bright spot as they unveiled a passing attack for the first time in this season, gaining 38 yards in six completions in 15 attempts with John Mann pulling in four of these. Also, the one Rocket tally was no fluke coming in the final quarter on a march of 40 yards that featured hard running by Paul Misch and Wolfman, with Misch registering the tally.

In the last period Farmington made a valiant attempt to equalize the score as Farmington quarterback "King" Cotton led a 70 yard scoring play to his left end to put the J.V.'s within one point of Waterford. Farmington missed the extra point and the score stood 14-7.
