Mr. Todd is the manager of the A & P Store at 15 Mile and Orchard Lake Road in Farmington.

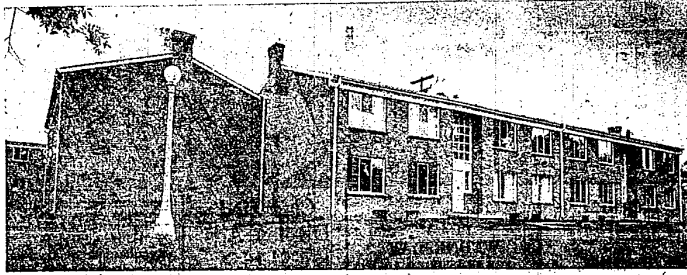
Wedding Vows Spoken: Oct. 6
