Arthur S. Owens, Past President of the International City Manager's Association, writing in the American Library Association Magazine, states "Poor library service is a luxury no community can afford."

He goes on to say that it is the responsibility of citizens, municipalities and other governmental units to do everything possible to advance and promote our public libraries, for when our communities are judged by their libraries the judgement is based, not only on the current status, but upon past records of advancement. He points out the role that outstanding public libraries have played in the industrial and cultural advancement of Roanoke, Va., Charlotte, N. C., and New Orleans, La. Industry seeks its new homes in communities where fulfillment is prominent among which is an outstanding library service.

A GOOD LIBRARY serves all the people and people in who come to the story telling session and stay to look at picture books, to read a magazine, the hobbyist who looks for the newest developments in the hobby, the retired worker who follows a reading program, serious or relaxing, the business man who looks for new ideas, and the young people who find inspiration for outstanding school papers.

Guide To Beauty

Eye make-up is the one thing which instantly improves any woman's appearance. Any woman who has lovely eyes and fresh, new beauty if she gives her eyes the proper frame. Beauty and fashion make-up is now as basic for day and evening wear as lipstick.

The most beautiful eyes are spaced so that the distance between them is equal to the length of one eye. If the eyes should be not quite so far apart as this, one would like to have the illusion of widely spaced eyes can be created by the manner in which the eyebrows are plucked and the eye brows are applied. Just as the framing odds importance to a painting, a natural brow line enhances the eye, and that any other feature detracts from the face.

THESE GENERAL rules will help you in determining the natural shape for a brow. The eyebrow should begin at a point above and on a line with the tear duct. The shape of the eyebrow should follow general rule with the highest point of curvature of the brow coinciding with the place on the forehead where the frontal bone descends. This is most generally directly above the outer edge of the iris of the eye. The eyebrow should end at the point where the eyebrow intersects the extension of an imaginary line drawn from the curve of the nostril to the outer corner of the eye.

To define and fill-out the brow-line, use a well sharpened eyebrow pencil, employing a short light stroke as if sketching in tiny hairs. Avoid drawing a continuous hard line through the brows. This stands out grossly and gives harsh expression to the face. If the brows are scanty or faded, it may be necessary to use two shades of pencil to give the most natural finish of the brow. Match the color of the brows to the deepest tone of the hair.

To generalize the proper shade to be used, you can follow this guide:

Browns will use light brown or gray. Gray is the deepest tone in ash-brow range. Use light brown for brunettes and red-heads. It may be necessary to combine the use of ash-brow pencil with light brown, depending on the deepness of color in the hair. Use dark brown for brunettes and for sparingly light hair, combine dark brown and gray. Black pencil should never be used on the eyebrow. The effect is always too harsh and paints gray pencil is used for silver to white hair.

You will find it very helpful to use all eye-brow brush when applying your eyebrows.
