# CAPTURE THE ELEGANCE

Of "Walks in Beauty," in all shapes, forms and sizes. Whether you be short, medium or tall, walk with poise, confidence and beauty.

The English poet, Byron, has immortalized more than a lovely heroine in his classic work, "She Walks in Beauty." He has immortalized a thought in which there is at least as much truth as poetry.

Every movement you make—walking, climbing stairs, getting into a car—is an opportunity to create an impression of beauty, or destroy it. An important part of a true beauty is grace, poise, assurance. That's why young actresses (older ones, too) spend so much of their time developing and maintaining a controlled, obedient body, as well as a lithe, supple physique.

Moving like a beauty starts inside, mysteriously, with a feeling like a beauty. It is developed by daily practice. It makes it a natural, unaffected part of your own best self.

**ONE THING** the average American young woman is not admired for is her walk. With poor posture largely responsible, most of us walk as though we came in parts that weren't assembled right. Try this:

1. Start walking from a correct position.
2. Step forward with left foot, keeping weight of body over the right foot.
3. Shift weight to balance evenly over balls of both feet, keeping knees straight.
4. Throw weight to left foot.
5. Shift weight to heel of left foot, bending right knee and following right foot to rest easily on ball.

Step lightly and smoothly, no short, miming steps or long, awkward strides. Draw in the pointed straight ahead and swing arms easily. Movement should spring from the balls of the feet. And if you think this takes a lot of practice, it does.

Climbing stairs. Going up, keep back straight and let thigh muscles do the work. Don't haul yourself up by the railing. Come down, keep head erect, lowering only your eyes if you must. Feel each step with your feet.

Entering and Exiting a Car: Don't climb in, head first and humped over. Step in sideways, and over the seat, drawing in the other foot. Some cars are best negotiated by leading with the hips. With both feet on the ground, sit down sideways, then lift feet smoothly in after you.

To leave car, place one foot on the ground, step in and gracefully. Try not to heave yourself up by your arms. If you have an escort, wait till he comes around to your side and helps you out.

Ladies, Be Seated: Relax into chair. It's not the same as collapse. Keeping back straight, lower yourself to the seat. Keep tummy in, shoulders back, feet flat on the floor, legs together, or cross feet at ankles.
