Bluejays Sink FHS Reserves

The JV Southfield Jays were really flying high and away last Thursday night as they buried the inept Falcons by a 23-4 score at Southfield.

The Falcons began as if they were going to make short work of polishing off the Jays by taking the first two minutes of the game. Russ Robinson's 30 yard kick around left end, and "SARZOGAS" (a kid with a middle name) gained 14 set up the score. Then Robinson scampered 12 yards for the touchdown, "Arkansas" (a kid with a middle name) added 3 yards for the extra point and Farmington had a 7-0 lead.

From that point on Southfield completely controlled the game. Immediately after the Falcons scored, Southfield rebounded with a tally of their own on a seven yard scamper by their left halfback. The 14-0 point was no good and the score was 7-6.

In the second quarter Southfield led 10-6 after a scorching series of aerial circuits that battered the hapless Falcons into submission. The three scoring plays were good and the pass defense leaked like a sieve. The half ended with Southfield holding a solid 23-4 lead.

In the fourth quarter Southfield closed out their scoring on a one yard touchdown plunge. The extra point was good and the game ended with a 23-7 lead.

Late in the fourth quarter the Falcons scored with lightning quickness on a 60 yard pass to their left halfback. The particular passing two some has become as synonymous as ham and eggs as far as the Falcons' offense was concerned this year.
