

Raiders Reign Co-Champions In JV Circuit

The Raiders' J.V. unit wound up the season as Co-Champs with Birmingham Grizzlies of the Tri-Rivers Conference.

Last Thursday the Raiders clinched a tie for first place by beating Southgate 25-12.

SCORING FOR NFHS was Jim Lindeman on a five yard run in the first quarter. Bob Lindeman scored around end in the second quarter, and Jerry Powers added the extra point making the score 13-0 at the half.

The Sabers of Southgate came out and on the kickoff took the ball and ran 75 yards for the T.D. making the score 13-6.

NFHS fighting back scored on a 15 yard pass from Ellis to Konek ending the third quarter.

SHS capitalized on a Raider fumble on North Farmington's own 20 yard line and in four plays made the score 27-6.

The Raiders' final tally came on a five yard pass from quarter-back Bill Elliott to right end Bruce Campbell.

North Farmington ended the season with a four win, two loss, and one tie record and look like good prospects for future varsity teams.

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Raiders Earn Annual Trophy In Hot Rivalry

The surprising outcome of last Friday's battle between North Farmington gridders and the Farmington Senior High School football team yielded some interesting statistics which makes the 7-0 Raider victory even more impressive.

North Farmington succeeded in gaining 129 yards through the air while holding the Falcons without a single completion in eight attempts. Yards gained on the ground by the two Farmington School District teams was more even with the Raiders taking the slim edge, 48 yards rushing to just 43 for the Falcons.

FIRST DOWNS WERE another story as North Farmington rolled up 14 to a mere two first downs for the losers. The Raider combination of quarter-back Lee Martilla and half-back Jim Acitelli accounted for most of the 141 yards total offense and led to Acitelli's two-yard touchdown plunge in the second quarter which capped the victory.

Acitelli gained 41 yards in 13 carries with the ball and caught six passes for another 40 yards to outstrip all other backs on both teams. He raised his total point output for the season to 57 when he split the uprights with his kick in the touchdown conversion.

During the nine game schedule which was climaxed last Friday on the Falcon gridiron, North Farmington scored a total of 121 points to their opponents 16. The Falcons over the season scored 105 points to their opponent's 115.

FALCON HALFBACK Bill Freeman led his team in offense with 27 yards gained in seven carries. He ended up with a 3.9 yard rushing average for the season in 103 carries which netted 403 yards.

Sophomore teammate Roy Leach led the Falcons over the season with a 4.5 rushing average, 456 total yards in 101 carries. Leach also led in points scored with a total of 42.

Freeman, Dale Pitcock and Tom Kaufman trailed Leach in point output for the Falcons in 1962, each scoring 12 points.

Freeman was next with nine points following by Dick Johnston, Greg Gebben and Frank Patterson, each with six points.

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Historic Mackinac Island Marks 150th Anniversary

Mackinac Island, sacred refuge of the Indians and guardian of the Straits of Mackinac, is celebrating the 150th anniversary of the War of 1812.

Arch Rock, near Port Mackinac, now features an exhibit last year the British captured depicting the formation of Fort Mackinac in a surprise attack on the American garrison.

Fort Mackinac, standing scratch atop the limestone cliffs of the island, was one of the strategic outposts in the British-American conflict of 1812.

The fur trade of the Old North West was the prime at that time. At the foot of Fort Mackinac and Fort Mackinac guarded the Straits through which the great fur fleets had to pass.

Built by the British in 1780, after they had abandoned Fort Michilimackinac at present day Mackinaw City, Fort Mackinac was turned over to American forces in 1795, only to be recaptured by the British in the War of 1812.

It was turned back to the Americans in 1815 and remained an active army post until 1895. Finally the federal government relinquished the fort and the island to Michigan and the state turned a major portion of the island into a state park development.

THE FORT MUSEUM, located in the soldiers' barracks, depicts the original garrison life through period settings complete with manikins. Another structure houses a scene of fort life in the 1880's dramatized with animated manikins.

Fort Mackinac's team room interior also has been re-done to create a more accurate Colonial atmosphere with various dishes and furnishings.

An orientation center has been set up in the fort's commissary building. Here visitors are shown the island's historic points of interest and told how to get to them. In addition, guides dressed as British and early American soldiers are available to assist sightseers.

New road and directional signs have been erected throughout the Mackinac Island state park area and a number of National Park-type outdoor shelters have been located at Arch Rock, Fort Holmes and during the War of 1812, and on the rifle range behind the fort. Historic and nature trails also have been developed.

VISITORS MAY walk, bicycle, ride horseback or take horse-drawn "cabs" on their island tours. No automobiles, however, are allowed on Mackinac Island.

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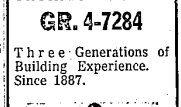
