Public Offered Use Of GM Library
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PTA Council Holds Workshop To Help Individual PTAs

On Wednesday, November 14, members of the Farmington Area Council of Parent Teacher Associations met at the Farmington Senior High for a workshop designed to help individual PTAs group solve problems.

Mr. James Brush, Council President, introduced the members of the panel who were R. A. Ambrose, legislation chairman of the Michigan Congress of PTAs; Mrs. William Porter, Director of District Seven; MOPPA; Mrs. Peter Bogatino, past president of the Farmington Council and current scholarship chairman; Mr. Byron Oliver, administrative assistant of the Farmington school system; Gerald Harrison, Superintendent of the Farmington Schools; and Mr. Nicholas Abid, principal of William Grace School, who was substituting for Dr. James Renzel, fluoride committee chairman.

Harrison praised the Council and the individual PTAs in giving for the Farmington Schools and for their recent accomplishments, in serving the school children and indirectly the whole community. He spoke of the tremendous population growth in the area. That an average of one thousand children are added to our school age population each year. Harrison urged that everyone support the proposition to continue the present millage levy which will be voted on Monday, December 10.

AMBROSE ACTS as a volunteer lobbyist for the Michigan Congress of PTAs. His interest is a natural one after serving as superintendent of schools in the Oxford area for 40 years. He spoke of possibilities and responsibilities of PTA groups to influence legislation concerning schools. He urged all members to be informed about such legislation to become acquainted with their representatives, and to contact these representatives to make their feelings known. He stressed that many unexpressed letters are usually ignored and that contacts must be of a personal nature.

He spoke of future legislation which concerns the schools and school children both directly and indirectly.

Mrs. Porter's time was devoted to the various committees that serve the individual PTAs. She said that not all PTA groups need the same committees, but should appoint those that best serve the needs of each particular group.

The meeting then turned into a general question and answer session. In many instances the problems of the PTAs were answered by members of other PTAs who had already solved the same problems. Specific questions that were answered were that a PTA which offers a tangible service to its school children will attract the parents. Mrs. Bogatino said that programs should be geared to attract the interest of both fathers and mothers rather than only one parent.

BEFORE CLOSING the meeting Mrs. Brush again introduced Mrs. Porter who surprised Mrs. Bogatino by publicly praising her for the service she has rendered to the Farmington Council during the 1960-61 and 1961-62 school years when she was the council president. Mrs. Bogatino indicated the Council's scholarship program, the fluoride program, and the presentation of the Wayne State University Child Welfare Theatre in Farmington. Two \$300 scholarships were given last year. There are plans to give a larger number this year.

The fluoride program is well underway and treatments will be started at Swinnow next week. The Wayne State group is scheduled to present "The Emperor's Clothes" in March. Mrs. Bogatino was presented with a past president's pin. Among her other duties Mrs. Bogatino was the workshop chairman. She was assisted by Mrs. A. Ambrose, publicity chairman, Mrs. Donald Robinson, Council secretary who handled the registration and name tags, and Mrs. Robert Davis, publicity chairman.
