Lecture Series Guest Speaker Is World Traveling Reporter

Listening to Robert St. John today working, you would find there is being at the exact same time. The Egyptians are really very gentle and kind people, they will tell you what you want to know. Speaking the truth is called being western. The Egyptians are increasing their population 500,000 per year, but the Muslims are dying on any form of birth control.

THE REAL CRISIS in the middle east then is (1) feudalism, (2) poverty and (3) paganism. Mr. St. John says the mind is not just a remembering instrument but also a forgetting one. This is probably a good thing. Because in time, we forget all the evils of war, we do not see the hideous details of our wars. They are put away in institutions so they won't disturb anybody. The United States is supplying arms to all these little nations.

He says we have a delightful lack of partisan foreign policy. Once in Tel Aviv he and a young woman went to follow a plane to the destination intended for dropping a bomb. The bomb did hit. It landed on an orphanage. Mr. St. John picked up a piece of twisted steel from the bomb. He later had it analyzed. The bomb was made in England. So, he says, here is Africa. In parts of the middle east if a woman breaks her leg the husband must shoot her. Because for statistical purposes a woman counts as 1/2 a man. As compared to U.S. which is one Doctor for each 10,000 people. In Arabias it is 1 in 200,000 people in the first year. Arabias is a country of either great wealth or extreme poverty. King Abdul of Saudi Arabia recently inherited 10,000 pieces of silver at a cost of \$50,000. This is not out of line because his personal income is \$200,000,000 per year.

Mr. St. John spent some time with a builder who was responsible for building 6 identical houses for 69 King Saud's favorite countries. 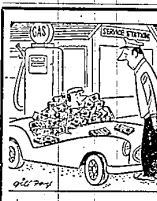

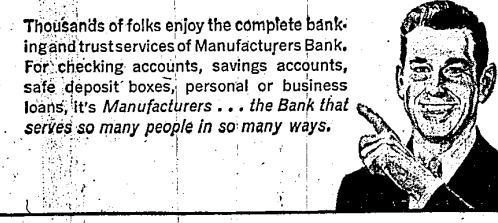
