Alumni Names Campaign Head

I. Paul Tesorero, 33125 Mauplen, Farmington, has been named Chairman of the 1952-53 Georgetown University Alumni Annual Giving campaign in the Metropolitan Detroit Area. The drive is conducted annually to help Georgetown University's educational needs and maintain its high standards.

Mr. Tesorero, a 1949 graduate of the university's school of Foreign Service, was Detroit Chairman of last year's campaign which broke all records. A past president of the Georgetown Club of Michigan, he is employed as an Assistant Cashier, International Department, National Bank of Detroit.

Kaline to Direct Farmington Area March of Dimes Campaign

Just back from his Japanese tour, baseball star Al Kaline is all set to take the reins of the 1952 March of Dimes for Oakland County.

Kaline's appointment as campaign director was announced by Leslie R. Ware, chairman of the Oakland County March of Dimes.

KALINE WILL HELP to organize the campaign in Farmington, where workers last year raised \$6,466.01 to combat chronic crippling diseases and birth defects and to continue the March of Dimes successful fight against polio.

The campaign chairman for Farmington will be announced shortly, Kaline indicated.

Helping the baseball champion to continue the work that has brought paralytic polio under control is the Oakland County poster boy, five-year-old John Reichert, who was born with a spinal defect and is being aided by March of Dimes research and care.

A native of Baltimore, Kaline is Oakland County resident. A "bonus baby" at the age of 18 in 1933, he became the youngest batting champion in American League history when he was only 20 and has continued his brilliant playing for the Tigers.

Married to his high school sweetheart, the former Louise Hamilton, Kaline is the father of two young sons, Mark, aged five, and Michael, born in June. He is a past member of Gordie Howe, Detroit Red Wing hockey veteran, in an engineering promotion firm.

It was March of Dimes funds that developed first the Sabin and then the Sabin polio vaccines, and a significant portion of the budget still is devoted to the care of persons who were stricken before the vaccines were produced.

MARCH OF DIMES funds now are being used to support research which offers real hope of discovering preventives and cures for crippling birth defects and arthritis. Kaline explained, as well as to aid victims of these afflictions.

Special treatment centers and evaluation clinics are being set up all over the country — a birth defects clinical study center was established in Ann Arbor last year.

March of Dimes funds are also used to provide health scholarships for medical personnel.
