

Michigan Bell to Aid High School Students

High school physics and chemistry teachers from Oakland County will meet at Michigan State University-Oakland Tuesday, Dec. 4, for demonstrations of a teaching aid on magnetism and a student's unit on solar energy.

The teachers' visits will be sponsored by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company and General Telephone Company.

THIS IS THE second series of three visits for high school students sponsored by the Bell Telephone System in its continuing comprehensive program of assistance to education.

Last year the first two units were introduced on similarities in wave behavior and transistorized audio oscillators.

This year, the first orientation unit on "Ferromagnetic Domains" is a basic approach to the study of magnetism. The program presents domain theory from the focal point of almost all advanced work in magnetism today.

The package includes a book prepared by E. A. Nease, a bit of the solid state physicist's research department of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, a two-part color motion picture, and seven sets of demonstration materials.

The second unit is a science kit for the advanced student.
