time as the charges were filed up.
"Any action we may take at this time under the present circumstances would tend to impair the integrity of this Board," Wilcox said.

The Board set its next regular meeting, December 10, as the deadline to resolve the answer back from Huck on his charges, and his request to transfer the party store liquor license was tabled.

WHEN CONTACTED by the Enterprise on Tuesday of this week, Huck said the charges stemmed from "a misunderstanding" and that he would do "whatever is necessary to clear the matter up."

"I sold a bar for a half-million dollars (Huck's Redford Inn) in Redford Township and never received any difficulty from officials there," Huck said. "I just don't understand the reason for delay in my application." Huck reportedly had gotten the "run-around" from Township officials here.

When asked if he would offer any information to substantiate his charges of Monday, Huck stated he would not.

"I want to drop the matter entirely," he said. "I don't want to involve anyone whose business may be hurt and I have no quarrel with them (Township officials)."

HUCK INDICATED he would comply with the Township Board's request to submit a written apology to settle the matter.

Huck appeared at the Township officers to pay personal property taxes on his business and was told by Township Treasurer Elsie Avery that his personal check had to be certified in order to make payment.

Payment of Township taxes must be made either in cash or by certified check.

Mrs. Avery had placed a jeopardy assessment against Huck's property when it was learned he was going to sell out to anyone who she explained was the normal procedure when a business is sold in the Township to place such a lien on the property to assure that any back taxes are paid.

A request by Huck to transfer the SDI license into the name of Clair Kandah first came before the Township Board at its regular meeting Monday evening, November 12. No action on the request was taken at that time when the Board was informed by Mrs. Avery of the outstanding taxes on Huck's property which would not normally have to be paid until January 19, 1953.

tracts would be rescinded and new ones issued "that the new plan would be effective during the current year."

AT THAT TIME a decision by the Board was promised the first of November.

The "index plan" the FEAs proposes is one designed to give higher rates of pay increases to teachers during their last years prior to reaching maximum salary than to those in their beginning years in the teaching profession. It is also a plan which offers higher maximum salary possibilities for those teachers going on to take advanced training beyond requirements for a masters degree.

A slightly higher starting pay for beginning teachers is also called for by the FEAs. The salary schedule presently in effect in the Farmington system provides for blanket increases of equal amounts on a year to year basis for all teachers until maximum salary is reached.

Prior to the regular meeting, the Board met in executive session with members of the FEAs salary committee to indicate to them the course of action proposed. Members of the FEAs committee made no suggestion of being publicly on the Board's action.

possibilities of cost cutting here but it would not make too much of a dent in total operating costs.

IN THE FARMINGTON School District approximately 90 percent of the total operating budget goes for salaries and wages of teachers, administrators and other employees. Any substantial reduction in the amount of operating money coming into the district would almost certainly require a reduction in the number of teachers on the staff, therefore.

Superintendent Gives Clarification

Dear Mr. Kiley:
We wish to clarify some of the statements concerning the forthcoming special school election in the letter signed by Victor B. Smolis which was published in the Farmington Enterprise on November 22, 1952.

(1) Mr. Smolis states that "it will mean ten dollars for every \$1,000 valuation." According to State Law, all school taxes are levied on state equalized valuation. The question to be voted on at the December 10th election is the continuation of a present five mill tax on state equalized valuation. There is no increase in tax rate involved. It is true that in Farmington Township the assessed valuation is about one-half of the state equalized valuation. However, in the City of Farmington, it is also about one-half.

Minority Protection

Dear Sir:
Your editorial on prayers in public schools was rather surprising. Your idea that a majority of the voters should have the right to impose their religion or their religious practices upon all the rest of the people seems to be at odds with the basic principle of American politics.

The distinctive feature of a democratic republic like ours is not that decisions are made by a majority vote; even a one-man dictatorship might be supported by a majority of compliant voters. The distinctive feature of the American way is that the rights of individual citizens and minority groups are protected by constitutional guarantees, and one of the most important of these is the guarantee of complete religious freedom for everybody.

There are a number of reasons why some people may object to organized prayers in public schools. Some may prefer to take care of the religious instruction of their children in their homes or in churches of their choice; some may feel, as Jefferson did, that their religion is a private matter in which the government should not interfere; and some may simply object to using their tax money to propagandize a religion in which they do not believe. Christians commonly regard Jesus as the great exemplar of right conduct and are likely to be just as much opposed to public prayers as he was, and there are many people who are convinced that the basic knowledge and disciplined thinking resulting from a good education is more effective than religious training in producing acceptable standards of behavior. Your suggestion that all such people should be forced to establish schools of their own does not seem to be a very good one; to restrict the use of the public schools to those who believe in saying their prayers in public would, I think, be both unfair and un-American.
